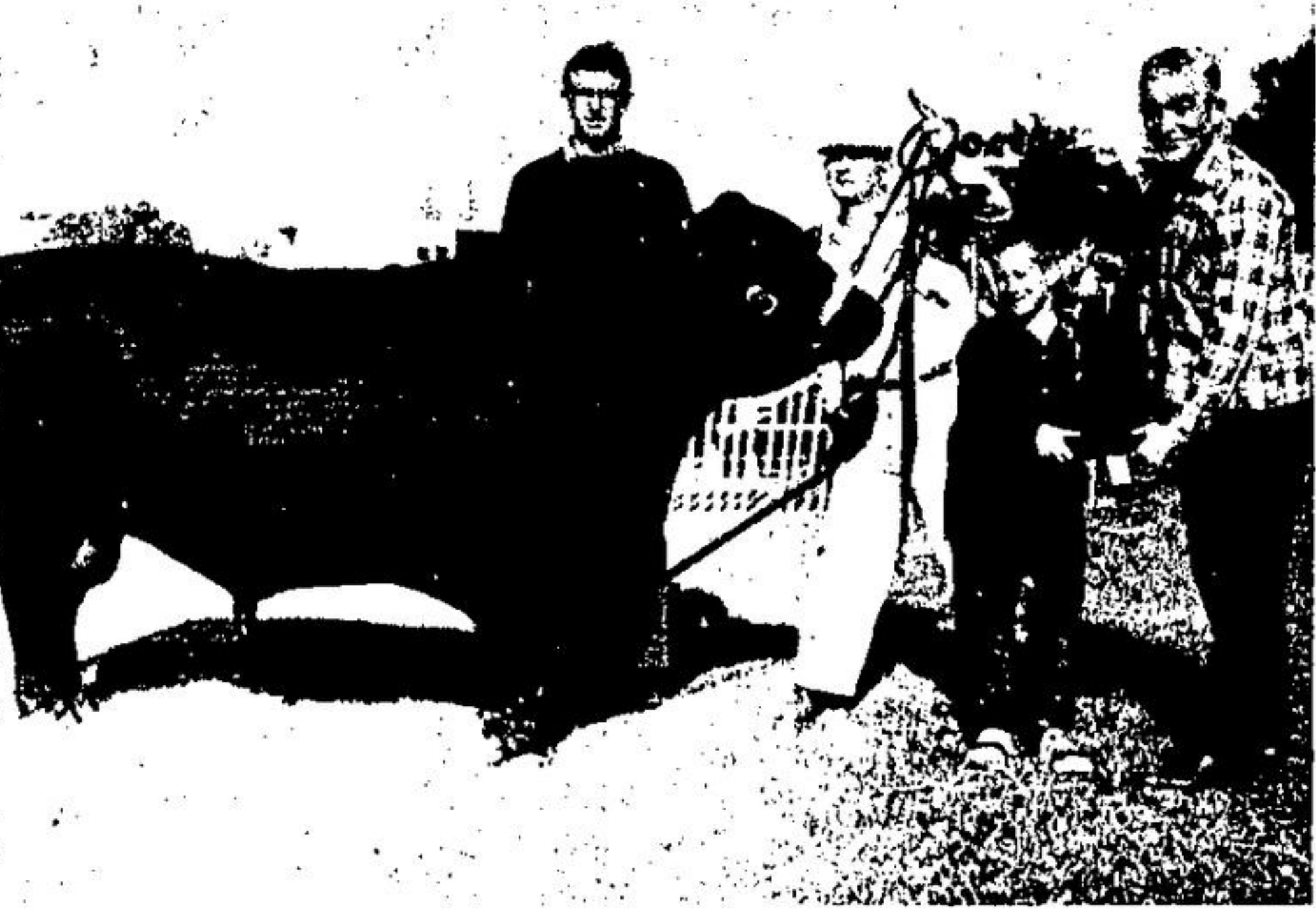

# Fence viewers require change

Bob Newman, 10th concession, Erin Township, appeared before Erin Township council last Friday to ask that a fence viewers' decision be reviewed. Mr. Newman had previously requested fence-viewers after a neighbor's livestock repeatedly came through the line fence, causing considerable damage. Councillor Bill McLean, who had seen the damage, commented that when the pigs were chased out, a hay field looked as though it had been plowed.  
The viewers agreed that the fence was in need of repair. Their written requirement was that the existing cedar rail fence be replaced with a wire fence, eight lines high.  
Prefers to rebuild Mr. Newman's prefers the cedar rail fence and would like to rebuild and maintain the existing fence on the 1,000 feet designated as under his care.  
Council declined to intervene, saying that that would underline the viewers' authority. Clerk E. If he refuses to pay, the bill may be sent to the township clerk to be added to the second resident landowner's taxes.
