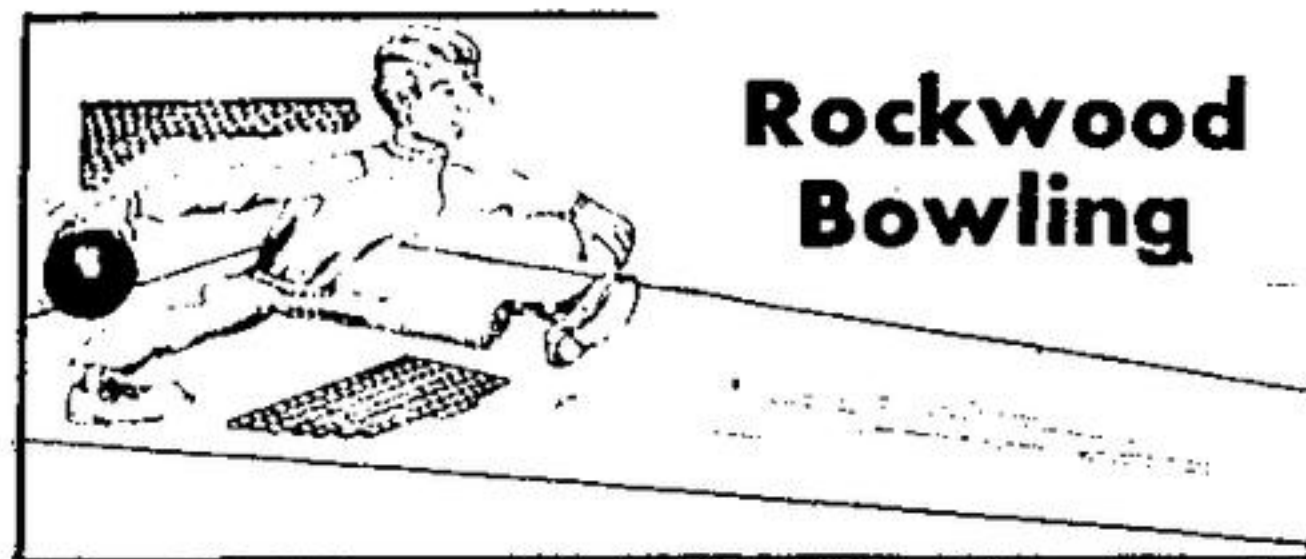

At their October meeting Monday night, Eramosa township council:

—Received a copy of a letter from Wellington-Dufferin M.P.P. John Root to Minister of Transport and Communication Charles McNaughton requesting that a one mile stretch of road on the Fourth Line be assumed as a development road.

—Following a request from the trustees of the village of Eden Mills, council decided to write them to say they will consider improving the Third Line, north of Ash St., in 1972.

—Reeve Warren Parkinson expressed the opinion establishment of a saw mill in the township would be compatible with agriculture. Deputy-reeve Duncan McPhedran agreed.

—Passed a resolution that the reeve, roads superintendent and clerk make application to the Department of Transportation and Communication for an interim subsidy on 1971 road expenditures.

—Authorized the clerk to pay fees amounting to \$105 to Councillor Bill Adsett for attending meetings of MODA.

—Clerk Lloyd Hindley reported the OMB has set October 28 as the date of the hearing for Mr. Duddick's appeal against committee of adjustment. Councillors Dick Strong and Ken Fair will represent council at the hearing in the township council chamber.

Questions sale of land

In spite of a warning from Councillor Ken Fair that council should think twice before "selling that little patch of ground in Everton for \$200, Eramosa has accepted tenders for the sale of two parcels of township land, one, Lot 72, Block D in the village of Rockwood and the other Lots 30 and 31 in Everton. Both parcels were reclaimed by the township, because taxes on them were in arrears for longer than the law permits.

Council accepted the tender of L. V. Hills in the amount of \$2010.

for the Rockwood lot. The Hills tender was \$610 higher than one submitted by Robert Noble. A third tender, submitted by Art Stovel was for \$760.

Tender of Robert Johnson in the amount of \$250 was accepted for the Everton property only other tender, submitted by T. D. McCutcheon, was for \$200. Although Deputy-reeve Duncan

McPhedran said he couldn't see what use the Everton lots were to the township, Councillor Fair reminded him the land contained live springs.

Clerk Lloyd Hindley told council one of the lots is assessed at \$25 and the other at \$50. Acceptance of both tenders is subject to the approval of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

Permit ticket sale file aid requests

Tenders have been called for the new post office building in Rockwood. These tenders closed on Sept. 23 and M.P. Alfred Hales has been advised by the Dept. of Public Works Regional Office in Toronto that the tenders have now all been opened.

It is understood that some good tenders were received in that they were within the estimated cost anticipated. It is expected that the contract will be let very shortly.

Eramosa Council has decided to allow the Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery to sell lottery tickets in the township. The province wide lottery will raise funds for the Gallery.

Although council has turned down similar requests from other organizations in the past, Councillors Dick Strong and Bill Adsett both supported the K-W request Monday night.

Important message to Ontario residents aged 65 and over

On January 1, 1972, hospital and medical insurance premium payments will be abolished for all residents of Ontario 65 years of age and over. This is in keeping with recently announced Ontario Government policy.

This policy will apply to the age of the certificate holder and will include coverage for eligible dependents. Premium-free coverage becomes effective on the first of the month during which a resident becomes 65.

HOW IT WILL WORK

Under the new plan combined coverage will be continued under the resident's present Ontario Hospital Insurance number. The OHSIP billing system will be discontinued. All residents 65 or over who remit Ontario Hospital Insurance premiums on a pay-direct basis will be requested to complete a premium exemption application.

As the insurance records do not identify those who will be eligible for premium-free coverage, the application, when received, should be completed by those 65 and over and returned as soon as possible in the envelope which will be provided.

If you qualify and have already paid premiums to cover benefits after January 1, 1972, a refund will be made for the over-payment.

Unfortunately, until exemption applications are processed we cannot avoid routine mailing of normal premium notices. However, residents 65 or over should not be concerned. If the notice applies entirely to coverage in 1972, please hold it until the application for free coverage is received.

IF YOU PAY YOUR PREMIUMS THROUGH A GROUP

Persons enrolled in groups will be reported to us by the group and transferred to our "Premium Exemption" file.

Groups will be fully informed about this in the near future.
