Credit regulations at problem areas

Fill, construction and watercourse regulations have been enforced in problem areas of the Credit River valley at Norval, Huttonville, Terra Cotta, Streetsville and Cheltenham during the past few months by the Credit Valley Conservation Driver Authority.

These regulations, registered under the Conservation Authorities Act, (Ont. Reg. 84-71) govern the placing of sand, gravel, garbage or any type of fill in areas designated by the Authority; building any type of structure in flood areas or below the high water mark (determined by a hurricane type storm) of any lake or stream; interfering in any way with the existing channel of the watercourse.


