## Board debates ramifications

A student in Halton County secondary school could possibly leave the school for lunch, visit the hotel for the afternoon and then write his own note to the teacher to explain his absence on returning the following day.

That is one of the ramifications of lowering the legal age of majority to 18 years that was considered at the Halton County Board of Education Thursday.

The board agreed to leave the matter of students imbibing alcoholic refreshments to the principals of the schools. It was pointed out the principal had the right to rule that a student obviously under the influence of alcohol was not in a position to benefit from classes. He would be apt to be removed from a class.

Assistant to the Director Em Lavender said he was happy to report no principals had been faced with a situation where students returned to the class after drinking.

With the lower legal age of majority it is also now legal to have a student running for the Board of Education, it was noted.

The prospect of political candidates entering the schools to speak posed a small problem. Director of Education Jim Singleton said all of the candidates would have to be invited if one were, but he encouraged the idea of having them in the schools.

# Council considers paving entrance to Limehouse

After hearing complaints from a delegation of ratepayers, who live on the Fifth Line just north of the village of Limehouse, Esqueping council has promised to look into the possibility of paving a stretch of the road next year. Councillors also agreed to contact the Department of Transportation and Communication to see if a 30 m.p.h. speed limit sign can be posted near a hill, which is situated there.

Mrs. Edith Regent told the meeting Monday night road conditions on the Fifth Line are terrible. She complained that graders working on the road stir up dust and that she can feel dirt on her kitchen table when the window is open.

Reeve Tom Hill explained council is undertaking to pave so many streets in the township's villages each year.

"Next year we're going to take a look at Limehouse and Stewartown. Maybe we can pave part of the road into Limehouse," he said.

Suggests reconstruction Reeve Hill wondered if there would be enough width to reconstruct the road. "We can get construction money sooner than we can get maintenance money," he said.

Road superintendent C. E. "Bud" Snow said there have been two engineering surveys taken on the corner, which leads into Limehouse.

"We contacted a man two or three years ago about blasting at that corner. He said he wouldn't touch it, because of the school

being there," Reeve Hill recalled. Limehouse school is located close to the corner.

Snow said the only way to cure the poor condition of the road is to hardtop it.

"We'll have to work towards that end," Hill added. "There's not much we can do this year, but we can pretty near guarantee it, if the department goes along with us next year," he said.

"If they don't go along with you, I suggest you let the potholes go deep enough so traffic can't go more than five or 10 miles per hour," Mrs. Regent's husband Otto offered. Mr. Regent estimated some cars are travelling 65 to 70 m.p.h. on the road.

Asks sign Another member of the delegation Don Brown asked about the 30 m.p.h. speed limit sign.

"If you can get it, I'll guarantee you I'll have the O.P.P. sitting in my driveway picking off speeders," he said.

A fourth spokesman, Joe Meurer, owner of Twins Woodworking, warned council about the dangerous curve in the road.

"One thing you should understand. When we asphalt the road they're going to go faster," Mr. Snow reminded the delegation.

"But we won't have the dust," Mrs. Regent replied.

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### Car-truck collision

A car-truck collision on Guelph Line at Eden Mills Road on Thursday resulted in an estimated \$1,200 damage to the vehicles involved.

A car driven by Joan Harcourt, 41, of Moffat and a truck driven by Albert Wright of R.R. 2 Ariss were involved.

Neither of the drivers was injured in the crash. Milton OPP investigated.

Two area men escaped injury when their cars collided on Sixth Line Esqueping, near Waterfalls Playground on Tuesday, resulting in a total of \$200 damage.
