



Planned new Speed River dam

Decide to go ahead Guelph dam project

Members attending the general meeting of the Grand River Conservation Authority in Guelph yesterday were given an in depth presentation of the Guelph dam project by General Manager Mac Coutts and Jim Jones, representing the consulting engineers.

Approved in principle earlier, the feasibility study proved the dam possible and the results indicate that the site was suitable.

Finish in 1974
Planned for completion to

catch the spring water in 1974, the project will go ahead with land purchase in the area.

The dam, which will be located on the Speed River, has received an award of excellence for architecture.

Construction site is west of Victoria Road (Guelph) between Highway 24 and the 6 Sideroad. The resulting reservoir will be approximately a mile and a half long and a half to three-quarters of a mile wide. It will stretch west beyond the Guelph-Eramosa Town Line and bisect Highway 24.

Remove houses
This will mean the flooding of Watson Road, the Sixth Sideroad and re-routing of Highway 24, with the acquisition and removal of the dwellings along the highway and in the area of the reservoir.

The western end of the reservoir will become a wildlife preserve and park, the remaining sections of the total 3,800 acres will be developed for multi-use conservation, reforestation, recreation, water management, and wild life.
