Let's talk about horses

Q. My western ridden horse bucks a lot when I ride him. He usually does it when I first get on. The bucking is not high enough to throw me off but I can't seem to stop him.

A. Many young horses buck from inexperience and a need to "loosen the muscles," so to speak. However, it should be stopped before it gets nasty. Check the saddle for fit and the saddle blankets for comfort and cleanliness. Are you dragging the saddle around when mounting or flopping onto the back? Is his back sore? Is the cinch too tight or the back roping cinch too snug? If all this checks out change your western bit for an English type snaffle. A jointed snaffle is good for keeping his head up and a horse has to get his head down in order to buck. A western curb bit has a tendency to tuck the head in rather than elevate it. Ride on a comfortably short rein. The minute his head drops and his spine humps, jerk his head up. Thwack his rump with a crop and holler! He'll be so surprised he will be unlikely to buck again. A more gentle way of punishing a horse is to pull him in very small circles whenever he bucks but the former method is more effective.

Q. How often should a horse stall be cleaned?

A. Ideally, it should be cleaned every day. However, locally most people have only a few horses, work out during the day, and have some sort of converted, concrete-floored, cattle barn. Deep bedding is therefore useful technique. The stall is well bedded with straw a foot deep or more. Each day the obviously mucky part is removed and fresh bedding thrown in-taking only a few minutes. The whole stall is properly cleaned once a week saving as much re-usable bedding as possible. The deep litter has the advantage of providing warmth and soft footing for a horse on concrete. Of course, your horse should be out every day for several hours and should have his feet picked out regularly. A standing stall should be cleaned daily because of the uneven nature of manure distribution, however, the job is fairly quick. Use lots of straw in your standing stall, also.

Nassagaweya tax billing problems under study

Township auditor S. Skinner tabled five pages of recommendations that are expected to alleviate problems experienced in Nassagaweya Township this year with tax billings. It was the first year the tax bills had been calculated by the computer.

Mr. Skinner explained the problem seems to have been compounded by the different rate codes used in the township. He said some of his recommendations went beyond the scope of council and would involve the regional assessment department.

Not out much
He indicated time had been wasted by the barrel at the township office, trying to straighten out errors that had crept into the system along the line. He said no tax bills were out by more than a dollar or two.

"The system ought to work but the people involved weren't properly prepared for it when it came in," he told council at their meeting Tuesday.

Poor example?
Councillor Jim Watson suggested the mixup in the tax

bills was a result of the regional assessment department being brought into being and it is an example of what regional government will be like when they bring that in.

"Yes, it is so efficient it will only take twice as long to do it," Mr. Skinner joked.
