Mayor appreciates people's patience

Mayor Les Duby feels Actonians deserve council's appreciation for their cooperation in putting up with temporary inconveniences, caused by many improvements being carried out around town.

"It behooves us as a council to express our appreciation to them," the mayor said at council's regular meeting Tuesday October 26.

The mayor added that rather than become too concerned about one written complaint he had received, which suggested Acton streets are very unkempt, he would prefer to recognize the patience

of "those who let us get on with our work".

Councillor Norm Elliott said he hoped the person who submitted the complaint is by no means representative of the town as a whole.

Elliott also tossed a bouquet in the direction of council's public works and utilities committee for what he called "one of the most extensive works programs in town in years."

"They deserve praise for making sure all the programs went through this year. I'm saying this not as a fellow councillor, but as a citizen of Acton," he said.

Christmas seal campaign starts

The annual Christmas Seal Campaign will open in Halton County on November 5, it was announced by H. H. Hinton Acton, president of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association.

Appropriately, chairman of this year's campaign will be C. L. McFadden of Burlington who was named this year's winner of the Ford Citizen of the Year Award. The award is in recognition of his many years of service in the interest of tuberculosis and respiratory diseases, and other community service activities. Mr. McFadden has been with the Ford Motor Company for 31 years and is presently Traffic Manager. He is past president of the Halton County TB and RD Association and has served on the Board of Directors of the Association since 1960.

New member

Each community will be represented in the campaign by a well known resident of the community, who also serves on the Board of Directors of the

Association. Acton will be represented by Mr. H. H. Hinton and a new board member Mrs. David Sweetman.

The goal of this year's campaign has been set at \$50,000 for Halton County. Last year's donations totalled \$46,000. Letters containing Christmas Seals will be mailed to residents of Halton on Monday, November 1, reaching their homes in time for the kickoff of the campaign on November 5.

Mr. McFadden stresses that donations will be directed mainly towards projects within Halton County involving the problems of tuberculosis and respiratory diseases. Special emphasis will be placed on the Association's new project of Pulmonary Function Testing, in which recipients of the test receive, free of charge, a specialized medical test to determine the condition of the lungs and respiratory system. Pulmonary Function Testing has been the pilot project of the association under the direction of Dr. D. S. Kober of Oakville.

Remembrance Day church service is in Trinity United church this Sunday, following the usual service at the cenotaph.

The parade leaves the Legion hall at 10.30 a.m. Taking part in the service at the cenotaph will be legion president Bob Angell, John McHugh, the Rev. A. H. McKenzie and trumpeter George Elliott.

Hydro line in news again township route under study

The controversial hydro line proposed to go through Nassagaweya Township is under discussion once again. The township council learned at their meeting Monday that the province had approved the 500 volt line through the township.

Ontario Hydro has asked the township to meet with hydro privately to discuss council's preference for a route through the township. Two are under

discussion, one proposed by the hydro and the other by former councillor Allan Ackman.

No private meeting

Council made it clear they would have no part of a private meeting at the Cara Inn but invited hydro to a meeting with council and the people involved at Brookville Nov. 16.

Council agreed they should not have to decide where the route

goes. They are against it in Nassagaweya and wherever it goes ratepayers in that district will be very disenchanted with the prospect.

Down right sneek

"It is down right sneaky of them to try to avoid a confrontation," councillor Art Gibson said.

The meeting is slated in Brookville for Nov. 16 and all of the people involved will be invited to take part in the meeting.

"I think the people have already said what they want. They said it on election day. They elected the provincial government with a strong mandate and anything the province does is okay," councillor Jim Watson said with a strong hint of sarcasm.

Council to prepare for works program

Approval of projects to be subsidized by the government under winter works programs will be of a much wider range than last year clerk-administrator Joe Hurst told Acton Council at a meeting, Tuesday October 26.

The clerk-administrator backed up Deputy-reeve Pat McKenzie's prediction that the program would be more expensive this year.

The deputy-reeve, one of council's two representatives on county council, said the Halton body has already petitioned the

government on a wide range of projects, things they didn't even think of last year.

"It behooves us to be ready for this program as well," McKenzie told council.

"We should get some work done on the industrial basin," he suggested.

Hurst felt council might be able to get some work done as early as next month, prior to freeze-up.

"The onus is on us to come up with some programs," Mayor Les Duby added.

The matter will be discussed at the next public works committee meeting.
