Pig operation "unbearable" neighbors complain to council

Basil McDonald and seven neighbors on Appleby line in Nassagaweya told Nassagaweya Township Council a pig-raising operation in that area was making living conditions unbearable.

Reeve A. MacArthur sympathized with the neighbors and said she would complain if she lived there. "It would be different if you lived near the farm," she told Mr. Krantz. "I thought you'd never get around to that, madam reeve. I would never have bought land in

Nassagaweya if I didn't plan to come and live here some day. I'm looking forward to coming to Nassagaweya and living with the pigs," he said. Council agreed to seek legal opinion on the legality of the operation in that zone. If it is a legal use it is out of the council's hands.

Mr. McDonald argued the operation should not be considered a legal non-conforming use. Other ratepayers complained of rank odors and thousands of flies the pigs attracted to the area.

Health Unit approval
Gordon Krantz who owns the land and is in joint partnership with another man in the operation, appeared at the council. Krantz told the council the Health Unit had approved the operation just a month ago. Krantz said he was open to suggestions on how to keep the odor down but it had to remain economically feasible for the operation to continue. He didn't indicate any immediate plans to move out of the business.

Council appeared split on the matter. Councillors Jim Watson and Cal McIntyre suggested the smell was just a hazard of rural

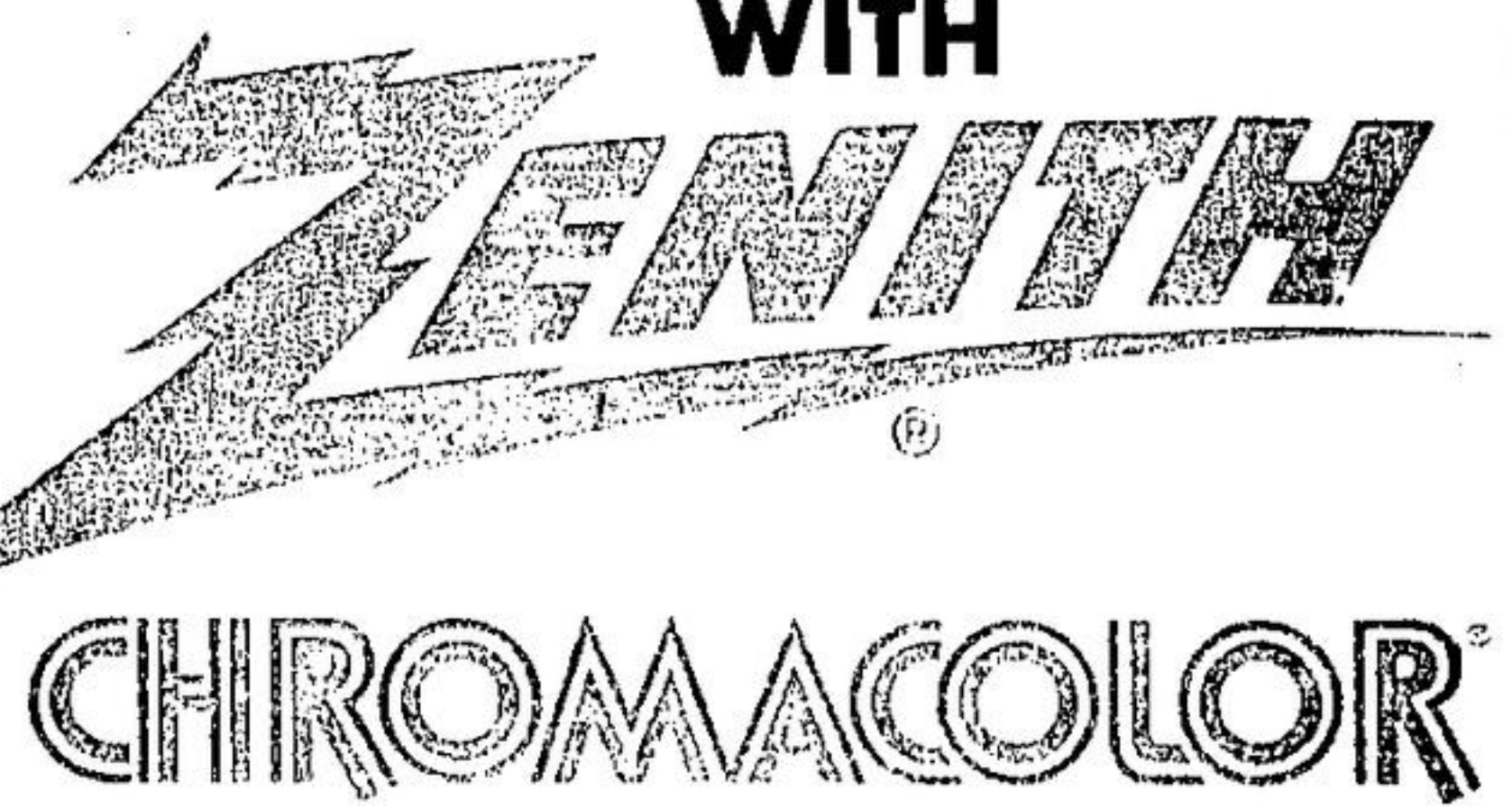
Pass pool by-law

An ounce of example is worth a pound of counsel.

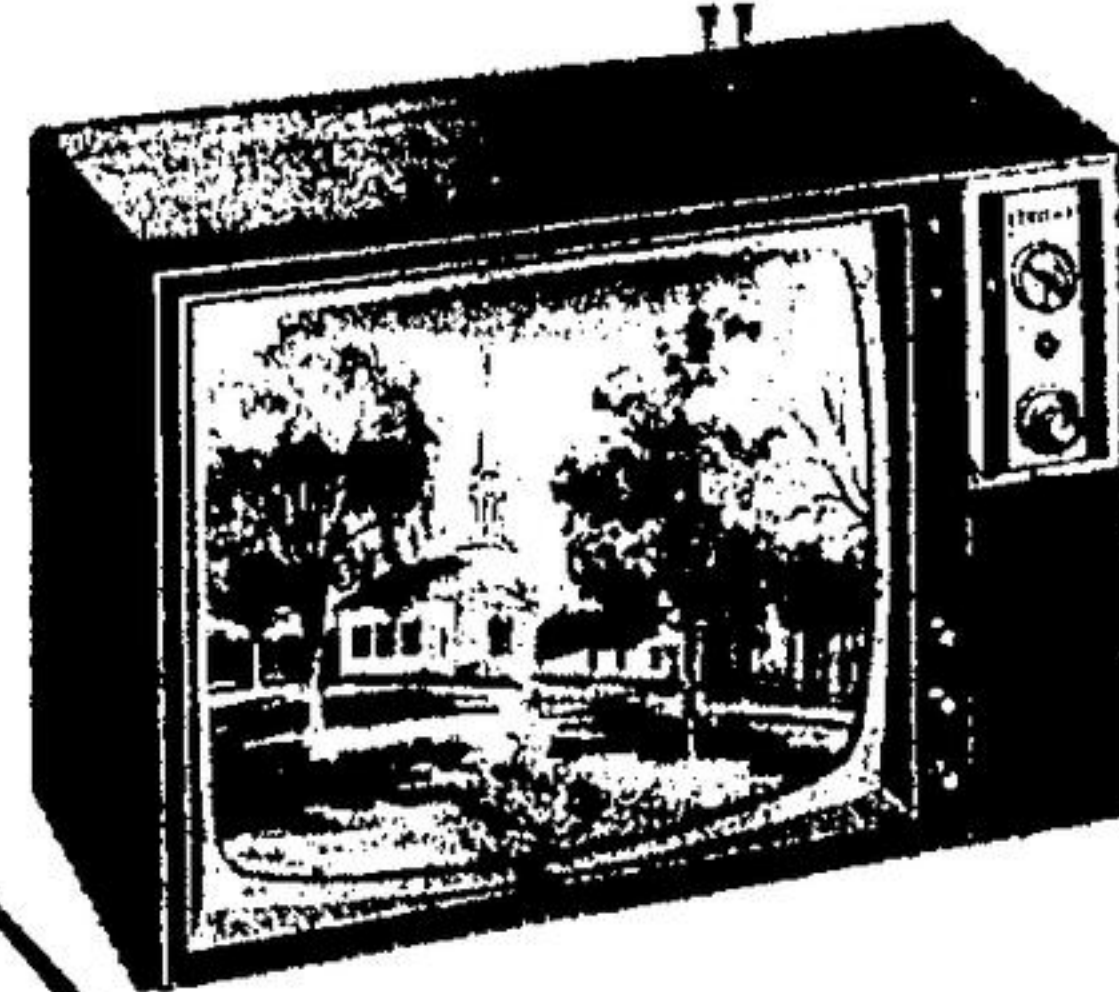

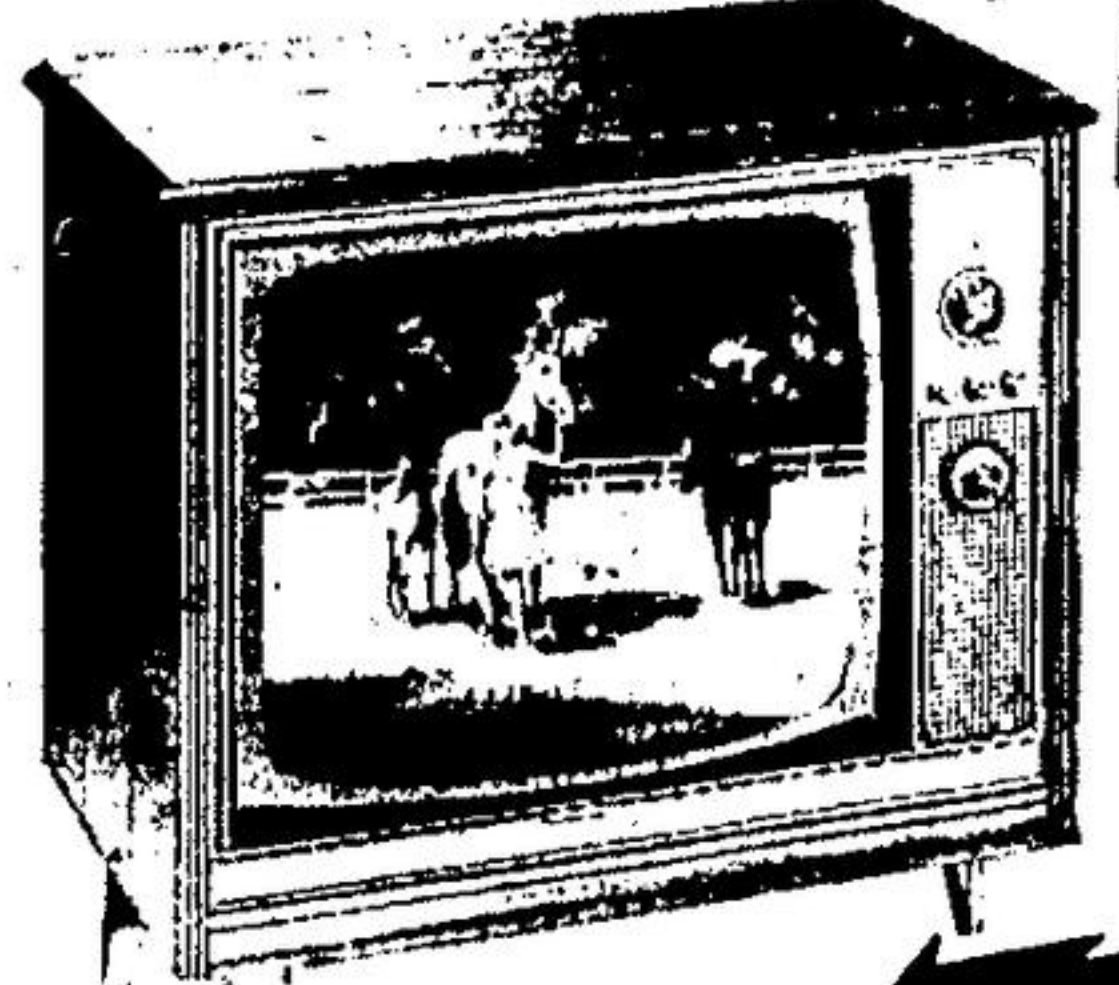
