But Deputy Reeve Duncan McPhedran was unconvinced. "If they are building something not called for, we should revoke the building permit until they have changed it," he said. The township issues about 10 building permits a month, clerk Lloyd findley told countil.

After further discussion council agreed they should ask for more detailed plans for building and instructed the clerk and building inspector by motion to enforce the new regulations.

There was also discussion about charging builders who contravened the by-laws by using a building for another use than is specified on the building permit.

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


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
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
