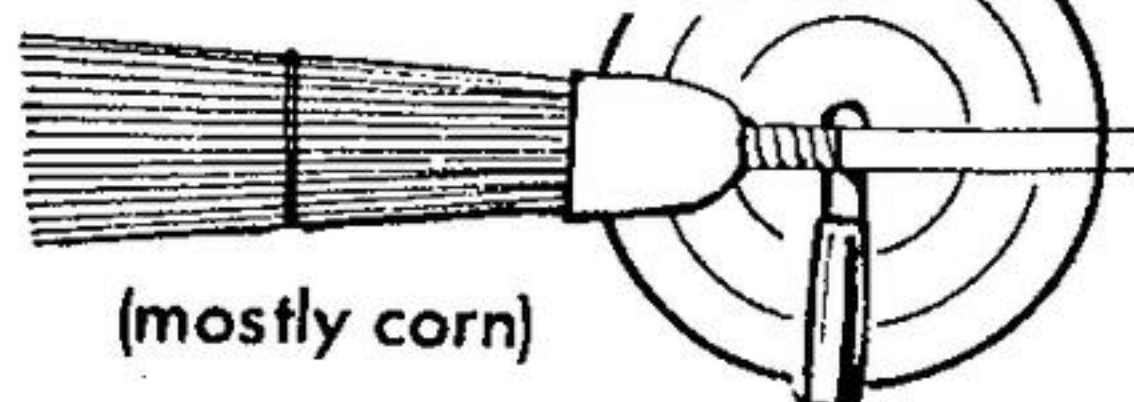

A University Information Program

IS TO BE HELD AT NELSON HIGH SCHOOL, BURLINGTON

ON Monday, November 15, 1971

BEGINNING AT 7.30 p.m.

Approximately 1,000 senior high school students and their parents are expected to merge on Nelson High School on Monday evening, November 15, to participate in this program. Representatives from Ontario universities will describe the programs offered by the various faculties, and answer questions on costs, enrollment procedures, residence accommodations, entrance requirements, awards, etc.

This program is being organized by Board of Education Guidance Personnel in co-operation with the University Registrars Association. Buses will bring students and parents from Acton, Georgetown, Milton and Oakville. Others will be travelling by car.

Many university courses are being restricted to applicants with the highest marks. Places available to first year students are becoming increasingly competitive. University expansion programs cannot keep up with the demand for places made by the ever increasing number of qualified high school graduates. Students, and their parents, should therefore get all the facts they can if university is the goal. All students applying for university entrance in 1972 are being urged to attend with their parents, as most decisions of this kind are family decisions.
