-Accepted an invitation from Wellington Superintendents Association to discuss a joint township two way radio network at a meeting November superintendent Bob Hamilton explained the Department of Highways would not sanction the expense by one township and suggested several municipalities band together and share the cost.

Grand River Conservation Authority considered rebuilding the dam at the old Harris woollen mills in Rockwood Conservation Park but it was lost in this year's priorities. The project will be budgetted for in 1972.

-Decided to ask the Grand River Authority to supply them with plans and reports of the proposed Guelph dam for council's persual, following receipt of a letter from a resident of the area protesting the forced evacuation of 125 families to make way for the flooding of "A good letter," commented Councillor Dick Strong, "with many valid comments."

-Decided to purchase 600 1972 red dog dog tags from the Toronto Stamp Works at a price

-Was advised a rabies clinic would soon be held in the area. time and date to be announced later.

-Was advised by letter from the insurance company that the township would be covered by liability should council decide to open the new Fourth Line deviation road around the Rockwood Conservation Area. Road superintendent Bob Hamilton told council he intended to close the old Fourth Line road the next day so traffic would be obliged to use the new one.



Remembrance "Shalom" heard by 500 Sunday

As the signal of Reveille and the Last Post sounded on the bugle, only a handful of shivering citizens were on hand last Sunday Centennial School. morning to view the traditional raising and lowering of the cenotaph flag in commemmoration of the men who had so valiantly given their lives during the period of the two world wars

from 1914 to 1918 and 1939 to 1945. The Acton Legion, represented by parade marshal Max Storey and three other members paraded to the Cenotaph with a lew Rockwood area World War Veterans. Don Hilts was the Comrade in Arms who raised and lowered the flag to the call of the trumpeter. Lloyd Dyer read off the names of veterans whose names are etched on the Rockwood cenotaph and wreaths were placed in memory of the glorious dead with Fred Wright of Acton placing the Legion wreath, Reeve Warren Parkinson the province of Ontario dedication and Mrs. Margaret Lambert of Acton the traditional John Hilts family

Those in attendance tried to keep pace with the marchers but it was too cold to walk slowly too windy to move fast and, for some, the 11.15 church service had already begun when they reached

the auditorium. The assemblage itself was an impressive one. Approximately 500 children and adults were on hand to unite in common prayer and dedication commemorating those who had given their lives in past wars but faithfully praying that they were the last.

The service which was conducted by Don Sinclair was an ecumenical one in which all four Rockwood congregations participated and the clergy from each of the village churches took part, with the exception of Rev. Ken Cardwell of the St. John's Church who had Ernic Slipp representing him in his absence.

Rev. Don Sinclair, for the

Rockwood and Eden Mills Presbyterian Churches, Rev. Ralph Williams, for the Rockwood and Stone United, and taking the place of Father F. C. Elliott who is presently on leave of absence for the Rockwood and Scared congregation was Rev. Harold Bedford who gave the sermon.

Put aside differences Rev. Sinclair in his opening salutation said that he was delighted at the response of those people attending the service as it was one day in the year when we can put aside our differences which keep us apart and join together. He said he was grateful for the participation of the Eramosa Choir which added pleasure to the eye, car and soul, and then Mr. Sinclair estended

his sympathy to the McNabb family of Rockwood referring to the lovely flowers on the platform as ones placed in memoriam of their recent bereavement. Mr. Sinclair then extended words of welcome to Father Bedford who-took over the service. Canadians remembered

Father Bedford, in talking to the congregation, presented an account of the valiance of Canadian soldiers throughout both world wars saying that in many countries where they had fought they had been remembered for their courage and abilities to fight together with strength and determination. Referring to the Jewish salutation "Shalom" which means many things in the

Hebrew tongue and is the

the approximate count of some 47 million dead as the results of the last two wars, 112,000 of which were Canadians soldiers, no "Shalom" has been reached and, in depicting the picture of the Canadian part in the two wars,-Father Bedford said that there several young adults and young people who had no conception of the horrors faced or the valiance of those who had fought to give them whatever peace they had today but that it was in vain because the "Shalom" which means "Hello, goodbye, God be with you and Peace over all the World" has not really been found.
