Although planning board members had expected to discuss annexation at their last meeting, a discouraging letter from the Department of Municipal Affairs caused them to change their agenda. Instead, a lengthy discussion on proposed changes in the town's zoning bylaw

Discrepancies and omissions had been detected since the last full printing of the zoning bylaw. Since copies are now becoming scarce and another printing is due, the changes will be made and incorporated.

That shelves It Planning board secretary Grant Usher read the letter from the Department of Municipal Affairs which squelched the town's hopes for annexation. The letter said annexations in Peel and Halton had been discouraged and deferred and there was no reason to think any differently. "That shelves it" said chairman Sid Saitz, "after that

long delay." "To tell us nothing," added Lou Bonnette.

Bill Coats said council was not content to let the matter drop.

Planning board had originally initiated inquiry about annexation in July, 1970.




