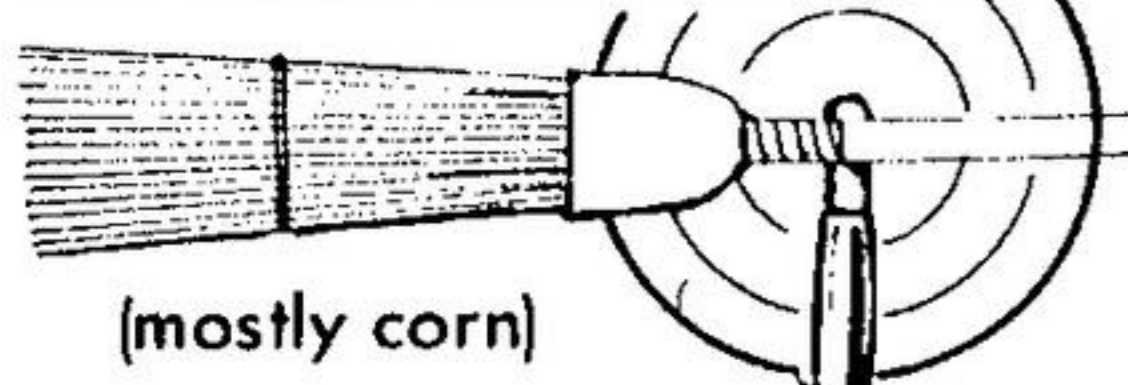


## Wi' Rock and Broom

equipment reaches the nearest hog line. Nor shall the curler be permitted to leap over, slide over on the other foot or even put his hand over to check his slide." So much for the rules for this week.

To the smokers: Be sure when you are smoking while on the ice that you do not drop your ashes on the playing surface. This will enable the ice to be kept a lot cleaner and not hinder the true course of the delivered rock.

Six Georgetown teams visited the local teams last Saturday night. Although the scores were not important, each team played their best to win. The wins and losses came out about even. And the visitors were high in the praise of the club that has been built here. They were very pleased with the condition of the ice.

# 'Green machine' rolls over Sabres

## 600 watch official home opener

Acton Sabres lost a hockey game Sunday, their fourth in a row, but its a fair assumption most of the 600 fans who watched the 3-2 opening game loss to Fergus will be back.

What the final result lacked in joy from an Acton point of view, the game made up for in excitement. Sabres blew a 2-1 lead, but their overall play showed plenty of hard hitting, hustle and drive, three ingredients obviously absent in their 10-3 loss to the same club in Fergus Friday night.

"We should have won the game," coach Bill Dawkins commented. "But considering we were coming off two disastrous losses, I can't feel too bad about it. Our forwards were hesitating to shoot a split second

second too long and we had a few defensive lapses. I still think we're going to be in the thick of this race yet though," he added.

**Credits goalle**  
Fergus coach Paul Cook gave most of the credit for his team's fourth win in five starts to netminder Tom Broderick, who kicked out 45 shots, including 22 in the second period, when Sabres outshot the visitors 23-3.

"Tom kept us in the game in the second period till we were able to bounce back in the third," he said. "Acton has a big rough club, this league's going to be a real dogfight yet," he added.

Determined not to repeat their miserable Friday night performance, Sabres came out hitting from the opening whistle. Over exuberance cost them nine

first period penalties and kept them shorthanded for most of the period.

George McPhail picked up seven minutes, two for sending Kim Belnes flying right over top of the boards on what looked like a good clean shoulder and five for the scrup that followed the incident. Brad Timbers and Randy Weldon sat out subsequent minors leaving Acton two men short, when Terry Bolger blasted a rising slapshot from outside the blue line past Craig Weldon for the first Fergus goal at 9:35. Sandy Fleming assisted.

**The score**  
Following another bout of fistcuffs between Gary Turkosz and Fergus rearguard Merv Griffin, in which the combatants received five minute sentences

each, McPhail tipped in Ted Harmer's shot from the point to tie the score at 17:05. Ray Evans fed the puck back to Harmer.

Sabres stuck to hockey in the second period and would have scored three or four goals, except for Broderick's acrobatics. Ray Evans scored the only goal of the period from a scramble in front of the net with Dale Fisher assisting. Fergus disputed the goal, claiming Broderick had smothered the puck before it crossed the line, but referee Lloyd McQueen allowed it to stand, after conferring with the goal judge. Sabres held a wide margin in second period play.

Two defensive lapses in the third period cost Sabres the game. Tim O'Sullivan cashed in Sandy Fleming's pass to tie the score at 6:18 and Terry Bolger banged in the winner from in front of the net four minutes later. The Sabre defence was caught napping on both goals.

Monawhile, the "Green Machine" blue line brigade, headed by Brian Walker, threw up an all-right defence and Broderick wasn't really tested in the final 15 minutes of the game.

**Score was tied 2-2** after one period and Fergus led only 4-2 heading into the third. The "green machine" scored almost at will in the third, as Sabres stood around and watched.

Coach Dawkins expects Morrison will be sidelined for two weeks. Sabres host Bradford Vasey's Friday night at 8:30 and play Schomberg Cougars in Schomberg, Sunday at 2.
