Regional government predicted here soon

Robert Nixon, leader of the Liberal Party in Ontario has predicted regional government would be forced on four areas of Ontario within a year. He made the statement in a speech to the Empire Club in Toronto, Thursday.

"Even though local government costs in the new Niagara Region went up 40 per cent in the first 18 months, still it looks as if other areas are slated for the same treatment."

"Just like the imposition of

County Boards of Education occurred six weeks after the election of 1967, so this new push to regionalize will occur in the early part of the term to let the political heat dissipate well before 1975. Halton-Peel, Hamilton-Wentworth, Haldimand-Norfolk and Oshawa-Ontario are the areas slated for regionalization." Nixon told the group.

municipalities debenturing through Hydro for improvements. But the mayor said the commission here operates on a system which frowns on paying out debentures which would eventually result in consumers paying more for their power. The necessity of new sewer mains to handle proposed development was also discussed and it was noted the town faced some big problems in this regard.

Survey 2,000

Halton County Health Unit will undertake a survey of 2,000 volunteers in a medical research project to determine the frequency of abnormal cholesterol levels in the whole population.

From these studies it is hoped that some light will be thrown upon the relationship of blood lines in children to determine who may develop arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries) if untreated.

Compact survey

The Halton County Health Unit will conduct the survey in conjunction with the Sick Children's Hospital. Where an abnormal cholesterol level is identified, the person (or parents of a minor) will be interviewed and advised to seek further testing and appropriate treatment under the supervision of a family physician.
