attend in future, as a result of a discussion at Monday night's regular meeting. Up until now councillors serving on the Georgetown fire area committee have received a flat rate of \$50 per year and those serving on the Acton lire area

committee \$30 per year. Milton

fire area committee members

have been paid \$25 per meeting.

Ridiculous Councillors agreed it is ridiculous to have members of the Georgetown committee receiving only \$50 yearly, even though they might attend more meetings than Milton committee

members. "It does seem unfair," Deputy-Russell commented. "Georgetown has the biggest area and the most equipment to look after."

Councillor Dick Howitt, a member of the Milton fire area committee, concurred.

"I go to four or six meetings a year, none of which is probably as difficult as Georgetown, for \$25," he said. "The Georgetown committee is usually the busiest and the toughest. A flat rate of \$50 is ridiculous."
