

Monday night. J. D. DeGrandis registered an objection over the proposed line with the township council, claiming the right of way would have a disastrous effect on his property on which he has spent much money and time. He defended council's stand on the controversy stating if Eramosa "got into it like Nassagaweya, all you do is make one group of people happy at others' expense."

Has council studied the right of way enough to know if it is taking the proper course? Mr. DeGrandis asked.

Councillor Ken Fair assured Mr. Defirendin they had spent some time studying the route and considering possible alternatives. Councillors agreed with Mr. DeGrandis that there was considerable confusion over the route the line would take which only now had been cleared up. It was first thought the route would be on Lots One and Two.

Mr. DeGrandis, thanking council for the opportunity of presenting his case when he was unable to appear at the first meeting, said he had no criticism of the way Hydro has treated
