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# Soft sell approach Yule moderation

Few events can equal the glow inspired by the warm conviviality of a holiday season

gathering. With its ancient message of love and peace, the season is always enhanced when we are surrounded by old friends.

No wonder, then, that so many of us are planning celebrations for the coming weeks. Not surprising, either, is the. temptation to make the evening as unforgettably lavish as our inflation-era budgets will allow.

Hidden threat And therein lies the one threat to all those pleasant memories that should linger well after the New Year. For all too often, much of this lavishness is directed toward liquor.

For a long time now, HAC has reminded party-givers that overimbibling guests who head for home in their cars can be a serious hazard to themselves and other...especially when their driving is combined with the dangerous weather conditions that often prevail at this time of year.

The wise - and responsible party host can do much to prevent this situation and still provide an entertaining evening for his guests.

## Soft sell

Here are some of the "softsell" approaches to alcoholic moderation the Hamilton Automobile Club recommends: 1. Serve that first drink yourself, if you wish, but

thereafter let guests mix their

own at a self-service bar featuring a variety of lowalcoholic beverages and soft drinks along with the "hard stuff." (Even if you're having a large party, stifle the urge to hire a professional bartender. He'll be even more generous with your

refreshments than you would.) 2. Starchy dishes can be overwhelmingly tempting and help to stymie alcohol's effects. Tasty sandwiches and hot, homeinade rolls, French pastries and cheesecake may sprinkle a few calories around, but who are you to deprive your guests of such gastronomical delights?

3. Parties tend to break up into small conversational groups, often stationed strategically around the bar. But a party host who is with it knows that groupinvolvement is the now thing. He won't be faulted for arranging an activity that involves everyone, including the swizzle stick crowd. Party games can de-emphasize the importance of the bar.

4. Serve coffee - and make it delicious - about an hour before guests are due to leave. It won't sober anyone up, but a cup or two is fine substitute for "one for the road."

5. So you've done your best and still wind up with a tipsy guest. Do him a favor by letting him spend the night or making arrangements for someone else to take him home.

That about sums up what the Hamilton Automobile Club means when it says, "Be First A Friend - Then A Host".




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
