
Hey, folks are seeing Santa around everywhere this year. Over last weekend several people saw him driving in Guelph fire before Christmas.



OLD RECIPE

Mince pie, a popular dish at Christmas time, was a product of the crusades, created when the spices of India and the Orient needed for the baking were brought to Europe by returning warriors. Some of the ancient recipes were excessive in their demands. One from 1394 required the following: "a pheasant, a hare, a capon, two partridges, two pigeons, and two rabbits; their meat separated from the bones, to be chopped into a fine hash; add the livers and hearts of all these animals, also two kidneys of sheep; add little meat balls of beef, with eggs, add pickled mushrooms, salt, pepper, vinegar and various spices and pour it into the broth in which the bones were cooked."
