Quebec holiday trip

Sunday evening, December 26, an eager high school group of eleven left Georgetown railway station to join the Tapis Rouge entourage of 130 students, from all over Ontario, who were travelling to Quebec City. After many delays and a good 12 hours, the group arrived at Ste. Foy Station, safe and sound.

An hour after checking in, at the Auberge des Gouverneurs, we went to the Quebec Parliament Buildings and, although we were late, the guide was waiting to show us through. Later, half the group went to see the Musee du Fort while the rest (including the Acton group) walked down to Lower Quebec, to take the new ferry across the St. Lawrence River and back again.

Cold wait

NOTES FROM ACTON HIGH

Students and teachers alike are back to school after a (seemingly brief) Christmas break. of the Marketing 400 class act as clerks and work in shifts on a volunteer basis.
On Wednesday and Thursday of last week there was a seminar held at Mohawk College, which was attended by Mr. D. Katz, Mr. J. Bray, Mr. J. May and Dr. P. Tamblin.
The speaker, Donald Stewart, educational consultant and teacher, is director of SLATE SERVICES, which is Systems for Learning by Application of Technology to Education.
Mr. Stewart presented his view of the learning systems approach to instruction. He said that teaching should be taught in measurable objectives and students should be told these objectives at the beginning of the course and then they should be allowed to work at their own rate of speed. Anyone could profit from this seminar, but teachers, especially. Out of the 650 people present less than 100 were teachers of public and high schools.
Some teachers have already applied some aspects of this system in our high school and others are contemplating the approach.
Mr. J. Bray was very impressed and supports the idea, Mr. J. May: "I thought it was extremely interesting and a worthwhile effort for any teacher."
Dr. Paul Tamblin says "I'm starting to do, today, in the classroom, what I learned at the seminar. I have never been so amazed as to hear a person speak for two days and keep my interest, totally!"
Mr. D. Katz thought it "very informative and worthwhile."
