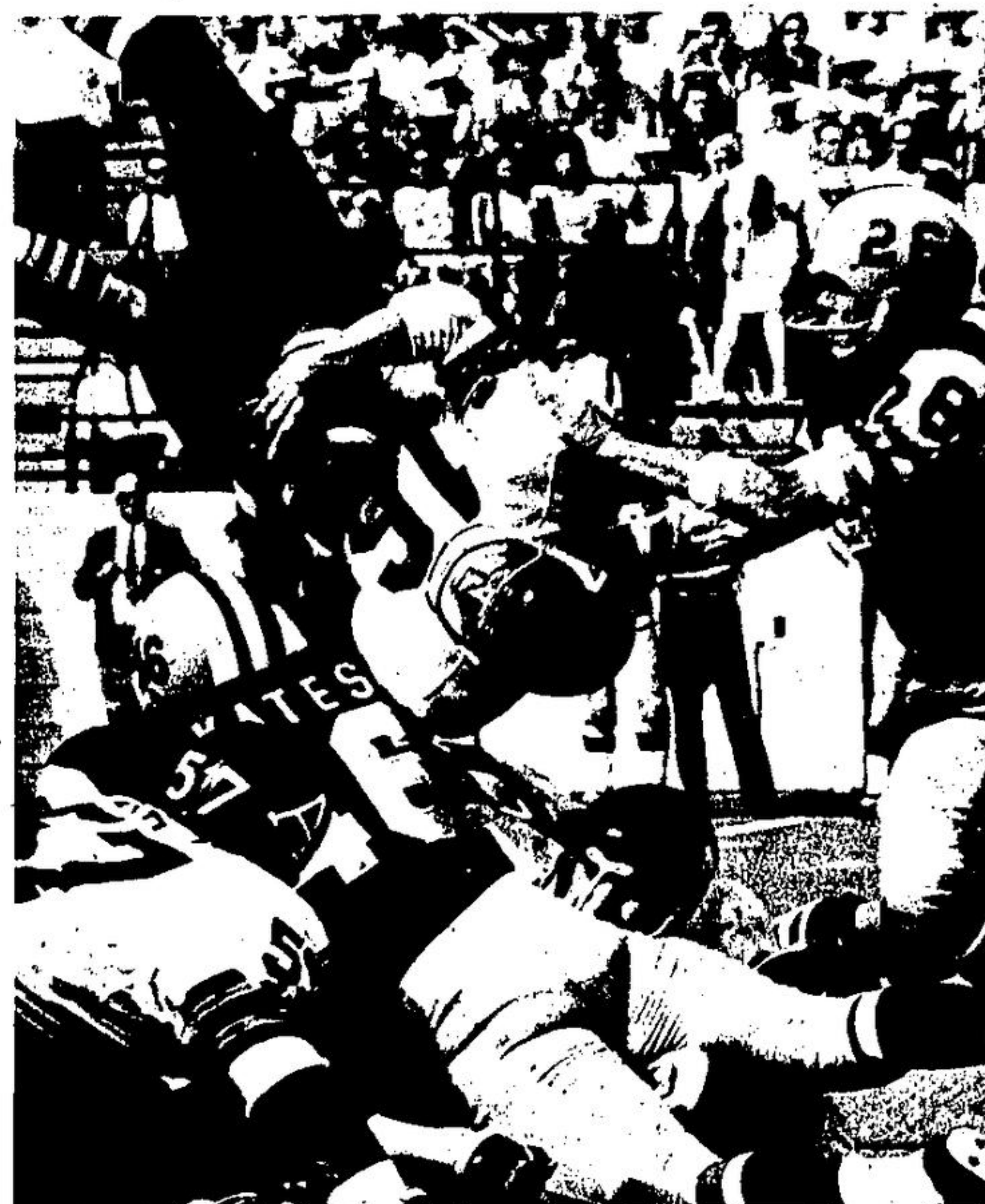

Winter weather ideal for hunters

The first snowfall of the winter is responsible for the big smile on the face of the rabbit hunter. A few hunters prefer the early fall with bare, unfrozen ground and the brilliant colours of the leaves and foliage, but the majority eagerly look forward to a blanket of snow and the chilly invigorating temperatures of early winter.

Rabbit tracks, now plainly seen in the snow, seem to bolster enthusiasm and offer encouragement. Rabbits, with the exception of the varying hare (snowshoe rabbit), show up better against a white background and the colder temperatures that accompany the snow are more conducive to hunting than the balmy days of early October. However, the snow cover and the cold and windy weather brings about changes in the behaviour of the rabbit population. The cottontail rabbits living in light open hardwoods, brush fences, old orchards and grassy fields where the cover is sparse, tend to "hole up" during the daytime in groundhog burrows, under buildings, in log and rail piles and stumps. The wise hunter now concentrates his efforts in the heavy cedar swamps, evergreens, plantations, thick willow and dogwood swales and areas of windfalls and brushpiles. In these areas it is still possible to "jump" a cottontail in the midst of winter weather. It is illegal to use a live
