


Halton County Council is being asked to increase grants to hospitals and change the basis of the grants. Currently the county grants \$6,000 per bed when a hospital is built or expanded.

At Tuesday's meeting of county council a delegation representing the four hospitals in Halton asked council to consider paying one third of the cost of capital expenditures for construction and expansion.

Terry Baines, chairman of Georgetown District Hospital Board of Directors, told council the changing trends in hospital care made the grant system antiquated.

Acton Reeve F. G. Oakes suggested those municipalities with hospitals in their community should pay a bigger share than those who have none in their own community but use the four

existing hospitals. Council made no decision but referred the matter to the ad-

### Anniversary coming up


