## Playground leaders' assessment

# Year-round coffee house second playground cited

Teenagers' coffee house all

your round?

A playground at the M.Z. Bennett school? More adult supervision?

These recommendations are listed among the answers in the questionnaires filled in by all recreation leaders last summer.

The assessment sheets were the idea of newcomer Brian Campbell, who was hired by parks and recreation committee at \$120 a week. His primary purpose was to provide a program for teenagers in the Y.

Playground busy

Mary Ann Freuler, supervisor of the eight-week playground program at the park, had a terrifically busy summer as her assistants' reports pointed out. She was paid \$50 a week. She ran her own group, directed the whole playground and assisted in swimming lessons.

Swimming lessons were considered very successful and were held mornings and afternoons in the pool and lake. Wendy Bell received \$75 a week and had Miss Freuler assisting her mornings, Cathy Ashley afternoons.

1000 staff

Other leaders joined in writing detailed answers and suggestions as requested by Mr. Campbell. With her Bronze Cross, leader and assistant swimming instructor Cathy Ashley, received \$40 a week.

Other leaders at \$20 a week were Cathy Krul, Rick Rocher, Cathy Dunn, Susan McPhail, Valerie Mitchell, Brenda McNabb, Caroline Merrin, Susan Mills and Diane Bousfield.

Coffee house

Brian Campbell recommended that a coffee house should be operated all year round. "This facility should be independent," he said, "from any existing activities." This type of activity would draw a large crowd, especially during the winter months.

For running a year-round coffee house he had two recommendations. A full-time person could be hired as manager and be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the facility.

Second suggestion was to employ several youths to operate the project on a part-time basis under the direction of a parks board member. A cross-section of youth, primarily students, should be selected for the jobs.

"The second concept has several advantages over the first. It is less expensive than supporting a full-time position and also affords more involvement in the project by the youths themselves."

Reviews summer

Reviewing the summer

program, he reported it as good. Attendance at the centre was "regular," although holiday activities interfered. Response to crafts and other special programs offered was poor. The ping pong tables, one pool table and basketball court were used "to their fullest extent."

However, a recurring problem was the appearance of boys from 11 to 14 years of age who frequented the centre in the Y. "I allowed them in during the afternoons if the older teenagers were not making use of the facility. The size of this segment grew—problems arose if I attempted to administer discipline in cases of misbehavior. At times they would disrupt the evening activities also. Their presence would discourage the older people from attending."

Herved need

"I believe the centre was a success. It did serve, to a certain extent, the needs of the youth population. It also provided some services to an unexpected group, namely, the younger-aged boys."

Mr. Campbell recommended that a facility should be made available daily for the 10-14 age group, primarily boys. He felt the Y is the best place.

His third recommendation was that the playground supervisor should be autonomous, solely concerned with the administration and organization of special events and general activities.

His last recommendation is that the resources of the town should be co-ordinated. A list of all available spaces in churches, schools, etc. should be compiled.

Supervisor overloaded

Playground leaders were asked to list their comments and criticisms of the '71 program.

All felt the program was good, but several repeated the feeling carried too much of the burden. She had her own group, yet had to leave to handle many other things.

Disciplinary problems appeared and were reported daily.

As a result several of the assistants concluded there should be an adult supervisor who did not have a group. An older person, they thought, might command more respect from some of the young trouble-makers.

Some also felt there should have been more leadership during special events.

Self boy

There was only one boy leader, Rick Rocher, and several commented other boys would have been good for the boys' groups, helping out with preparations and supervising on

sleep-outs and trips.

Several, including Miss Freuler, felt a six week program would be better than this year's eight weeks.

A playground at the M.Z. Bennett school for the children at the other end of town was also recommended.

Mr. Campbell's position and responsibilities with the playground were not understood by the assistants and several had criticisms of his lack of co-operation.

A large crafts area, which must be kept tidy, was a strong need.

Best staff

In her own report, supervisor Mary Ann Freuler reported on the best staff ever, good program and special events.

Her suggestions for next year also included a full-time supervisor, playground at the other end of town, male leaders and a six week program.

She felt the closing program should not be held in the community centre.

Her lengthy, detailed report was filled with very specific suggestions for other years. However "it was truly a great summer," she concluded her report.

Wendy Bell's assessment of the summer's swimming program

concluded August was more successful than July. She had various specific recommendations concerning advance information, lifeguard position, safety of the area and supplies. She found management not satisfactorily structured. In the morning, busy playground supervisor Mary Ann Freuler was also the swimming assistant, while Cathy Ashley assisted her afternoons.

The parks and recreation committee has considered the assessment sheets but no decision on changes has been made yet.
