Communications workshop held

On January 21 and 22, the Communications Board of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation sponsored a seminar for area teachers working on communications in education, at the Sheraton Connaught Hotel in Hamilton. This, the third in a series of workshops sponsored by the OSSTF Communications Board, was designed by the Communications Committees in Districts 6 (Hamilton), 9 (Halton), and 36 (Wentworth), in collaboration with Jack Hutton and Mark Barry from the OSSTF Communications office in Toronto.

At the media lunch, the guest speaker was Norman De Poo of the CIBC. He discussed some of the means of communication that are open and, drawing on his own considerable experience, warned us of the pitfalls attached to each. Although the number of area representatives at the sessions was small, enthusiasm was high, and those present agreed that the workshop was very worthwhile.

Encouraging them to persevere with our news releases and attempts to develop a "news sense", Bruce Jackson from the newsroom of radio station CHMI was also on hand, and pointed out the differences inherent in publicizing through the press and through radio-TV.

Saturday's sessions were more informal as members of the Communications Board led the area reps in "crit pack", "brainstorming" and group discussion sessions.

Friday evening, Paul Warnick, the managing editor of The Hamilton Spectator gave a brief talk on General Approach to the Media - hearing listeners for their short comings and unwillingness to be persistent with communications, and

Trustees want Guelph Line traffic rerouted

The trustees of the police village of Eden Mills would like to see the Guelph Line connected with a road through the Rockwood Conservation Area in Eramosa Township, Wentworth County.

The road presently takes a straight northern course through Nassagaweya and jogs left through Eden Mills on its way to Highway 7. The Guelph Line is a county road.

Sound them out

Village Trustees Norman Marshall and Rodney Bell and village Secretary John Turner appeared before members of Nassagaweya Council Monday night to sound out the members' views on the proposal to link Guelph Line with Eramosa's Fourth Line to Highway 7.

"The density of the traffic going through the village is increasing. The road at some points is only 38 feet wide where it passes through the village," said Trustee Marshall, who also added, "any widening of the road would ruin the village."

Marshall told council the road crossed three bridges in the village, all three of which were unsuited for the volume of traffic using them. "One of the bridges is over a hundred years old and is badly cracked."

Trustee Bell told council that connecting the Guelph Line with the road through the Rockwood Conservation Area would require the co-operation of the two counties involved - Halton and Wentworth.

"I don't see how we can be too involved," stated Reeve Anne MacArthur. "We can endorse their recommendation," remarked Councillor Arthur Gibson.

Village Secretary Turner told council, "anything that applies to the village of Eden Mills needs the permission of Nassagaweya." Trustee Marshall added that the
