Robert Little school boys' basketball team upset favored Georgetown Centennial 21-14 Saturday night to capture the championship of the 10 team Georgetown invitational public school basketball tournament.

Robert Little captured the championship by defeating Brookville 32-8 in the first round and Stewarttown 26-23 in the semi-finals.

Matt Spehar and John McCutcheon totalled 43 points between them in the three games to lead Robert Little scorers. Spehar had 23 points and McCutcheon 20. Other point getters were Jim Hurley and David Williams with 15 apiece, Kent Kentner with four and Gary Pickles two.

The fact that six of the 10 schools in the tournament are senior public schools made the victory even sweeter for Robert Little. Brookville, Milton Holy Rosary and Acton M. Z. Bennett were the other teams entered.
