On Wednesday the students were off because of a teachers conference.


On Thursday Constable Riley came and explained the hazards and laws of snowmobiling.

Reginald Rudd dies Feb. 7 in 86th year

A one-time Rockwood resident. G. Reginald Rudd passed away at St. Joseph's Hospital on Monday, February 7 in his 86th year. The funeral and committal service was conducted at the Wall Chapel of the Lee and Constance Funeral Home on February 9.

Born at Arkell in 1886 he spent his early years helping his father Wm. Jas. Rudd on his farm near Eden Mills specializing in Devon cattle raising.
