ESQUEVING COUNCIL BRIEFS

At the regular meeting Monday evening, Esqueving council:

—Referred a letter to the road superintendent from J. C. Welr of R.R. 2, Acton, alleging that the township snowplow knocked his wife down in full view of the operators. The incident was also witnessed by neighbors, the letter alleged.

—Received two letters from Bill Schreiber, enclosing his reasons for not applying for another term on the committee of Adjustment in one, and taking the reeve and one other councillor to task for public criticism of the committee. Mr. Schreiber said he enjoyed his term on the committee but statements like those made at a recent meeting made the job of the committee more difficult.

—Received a letter from Ontario Hydro suggesting improved street lighting in Norval and later passed a resolution instructing the clerk to authorize Brampton Rural Hydro install a street light in front of Miss Madeline Smithson's home in Norval.

—Instructed the clerk to write Norman Douglas, R.R. 1, Acton, with the information that his application to establish a park on his property was premature since the township is still involved in establishing an official plan and zoning by-law. They advised him the application would be entertained at a later date.

—Approved payment of fox bounties to Ed Robertson, Hornby, \$14. H. DeForest, Terra Cotta, \$21. C. DeForest, Limehouse, \$7. H. Webster, \$7.

—Extended the time limit on a building permit issued in March 1971, to Rossitt Bros. for a single family dwelling.

—Received correspondence from Silverwood Women's Institute asking that a piece of land off Highway at Silvercreek be retained as a park. Council made no decision.

—A request from Robert McDonald, Lot 16, Con. 7, to revert a home on his property back to a business use was sent to committee for more details. The house was the site for a plumbing and heating business until 1967 when the business was moved and then used for a residence.

—Recommended the speed limit on the Fourth Line be reduced to 40 miles per hour for four-tenths of a mile north of Highway 7.

—Advised John Wagstaffe of Glen Williams that he would need only to get permits to move his house from its present location to the eastern boundary of his lot and erect a new house in its place. Mr. Wagstaffe was also advised the road he proposed to open would be his responsibility and would not have to meet township specifications unless he wanted it taken over by the municipality.

—Agreed to extend the present holding by-law until December 31, 1972, on the recommendation of planning board.

—Asked the clerk to notify the occupant of property on the east half of Lot 24, Con. 7, that he was violating the holding by-law by operating a business on the property.
