
## 203, 260 to triple a 671 showing Further grant for Kelso

The Honourable James A.C. Auld, Minister of the Environment and Honourable George A. Kerr, Q.C. M.P.P. for West, announced Halton approval of a provincial grant of \$7,022.10 to the Halton Region Conservation Authority for the Kelso Conservation Area.

This area comprises 390 acres of land in the Township of Nassagaweya, where the Authority has carried out considerable development work and a grant was authorized to apply on the cost of fire protection and provision of two washroom buildings.

In order to meet health regulations and additional hydro requirements, it has been necessary to increase the cost of this development program and this grant applies on the ad-

ditional expenditure involved. All member municipalities will bear the Authority's share of the cost.



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
