Last Easter Sunday, I whomped up such a successful dinner that I made notes all over the back page of my cook-book on how I managed, so I could do it again this year.

The menu included Baked Ham, Scalloped Potatoes, Parsleyed Carrots, Fiddleheads, and Lemon Pudding for dessert. I had to do a bit of running around while shopping, getting the ham up one end of town and fiddleheads up the other, but it was worth it.

My afternoon schedule ran something like this: 3:00-prepare carrots and

potatoes. 3,30-put the above in oven at 375 degrees, wash dishes, prepare Lemon Pudding.

4.00-put ham and pudding in oven, reduce heat to 325. Set table.

4.30—Glaze ham, remove lids from vegetables, spend half an hour outside.

5.00-Put fiddleheads on to cook, and everything should be done. (SHOULD BE). 5.15-Serve with pride.

PARSLEYED CARROTS

Pare 8 medium carrots and slice into slivers. Place in baking dish and add 2 Tosp. butter, 1 Tosp. brown sugar, 14 tsp. salt, 14 cup water. Bake, covered, at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Remove lid and bake another 15 to 30 minutes, till done. Sprinkle with fresh parsley.

SCALLOPED POTATOES

Peel and slice six medium potatoes. Place in greased casserole, sprinkle with flour, salt and pepper, and dot with butter. Add a little diced onion, if you like. Repeat layers till dish is three-quarters full. Pour in boiling milk to almost cover potatoes. Cover and bake at 375 degrees until milk bubbles, then reduce heat to 350, for 45 to 60 minutes. Uncover for last half


