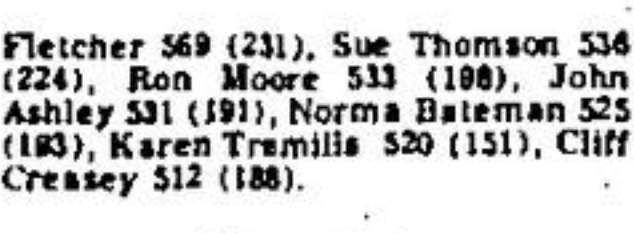
## STRIKES at Youth Bowling
