

Halton County hospitals will receive increased support from Halton County Council. At their regular meeting recently council agreed to increase support by changing the grant formula from \$6,000 per bed to one third of OHC approved expenditures on capital

Georgetown District Hospital will be the first to benefit from the scheme when they erect a \$750,000 expansion this year. County Council's share of the cost
