Halton County Roads Committee slashed budget

committee slashed budget estimates for almost three hours. Thursday afternoon and finally cut about \$600,000 from an estimated budget of \$2,822,100.

The committee slashed the budget by taking \$1,000 here and \$1,000 there and sometimes deferring entire projects for over \$150,000. But they still needed to cut over a quarter of a million dollars to receive provincial subsidy on all jobs.

Tighten belts

The province put a ceiling of \$1,064,000 on their subsidy which meant the county had to tighten its bolt and bring their share of the cost to within that ceiling or pay 100 per cent for everything over \$2,128,000.

Warden Jim Swanborough pointed to Milton's Main St. reconstruction job valued at \$295,000 as a logical place to cut. He said that program had only been put into the five year program because the committee felt there would be a subsidy for it. He argued other projects were in the program first and should be treated first.

Milton Reeve Ron Harris, a non-voting member of the committee, argue project should go and said the town would have been appy to do the work themselves and had no say in the recent county takeover of the road. He said it was essential the project go ahead.

County engineer Jack Corbett suggested the program would cost the town close to \$100,000 over and above the \$295,000 the county would pay. He said the job was due to have tenders let in April and construction underway in May.

The major cuts saw a \$40,000 Job at Halton-Peel boundary at Norval in Esquesing Township deleted from this year's budget. The money was allocated towards design and construction of a storm sewer. A \$140,000 project on No. 25 Sideroad in Esquesing was halved. The first part of that project will be cut and the second done early in 1973.

Cut Steeles Ave. A \$170,000 project to widen Steeles Ave. from Ontario to Harrop Dr. in Milton was all but cut from the budget. About \$1,000 was left in the budget to keep the project on the books.

The committee will also recommend to council that the new county garage be deferred for one year and the construction at 25 Sideroad near Acton be deferred unless the county is successful in getting a supple-mentary subsidy from the province. Together the two projects will ease the county roads committee needs by over \$200,000.

While the committee was insistent that the county pressure the province for additional money, department of highways representative Bruce Newington said it would be like trying to squeeze blood out of a rock. While he didn't entirely rule out the possibility, he left little hope for additional funds.
