

# Streetsville Georgetown divide championships

Streetsville and Georgetown divided four championships evenly between them in the annual 4-town tournament held in Streetsville Saturday. The host town won the novice and pee-wee titles, while Georgetown walked off with the bantam and midget crowns.

Acton midgets eliminated Streetsville in a pre-tournament total goals series, but were no match for the more experienced Georgetown club, which won 8-0 in the championship game.

Two of the three consolation games were won by Acton teams. Novices doubled the score on Orangeville 4-3, after dropping their opener to Georgetown 7-2 and the bantams edged Orangeville 5-4 in a game that was decided on penalty shots, after regulation time. Bantams were edged 2-1 by Streetsville in the first round.

Acton novices were clobbered 10-3 by Orangeville, but gave Georgetown a tough, battle before losing 5-4 in the consolation game.

**Saves day**  
Goalie Charlie Bennett saved the day for the defending champion Acton bantam team, after their consolation game with Orangeville was tied 3-3 at the end of regulation time. Bennett stopped five out of six Orangeville players on penalty shot attempts, while teammates

Sam Watt and Andy Broadbent potted a pair of goals apiece for Georgetown. Glen Stockfish, Jeff Freestone and Tom Davies added singles.
