Scarf causes tragic death- coroner

Dangers of wearing scarves were pointed out this week by Dr. Ivan A. Hunter of Milton, a Halton County coroner, who says the recent accidental death of a four-year-old boy in Acton emphasizes the problems of wearing a scart.

"There have been many accidental deaths in Ontario due to strangulation by a loose scarf getting caught and the knot tightening around the neck of the victim," Dr. Hunter said.

He suggests abandoning the use of the scarf and all other loose-fitting clothing in favor of more proper fitting clothing which presents no potential danger. "The hazards of the scarf far outweigh its benefits," he

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
