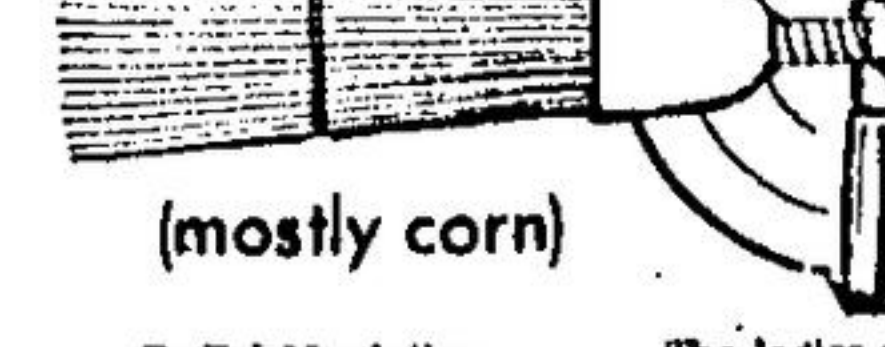
Players are selected by a committee, which views all tournament games. The all-stars of each series play the champion in that particular bracket.
