Report confuses health board

McKenzie continues campaign for improved health service

Acton Deputy Reeve Pat McKenzie is far from satisfied with efforts by Halton county

Health Unit to improve health services in the northern part of the county.

Near the end of a somewhat exasperating meeting of the Halton County Board of Health where this matter was discussed, McKenzle tore up a written report on the subject drafted by Director of Nursing Grace J. Leavey. McKenzie said the report did not indicate how the unit was attempting to provide

Members repeatedly asked Medical Officer of Health Dr. J. H. Chamberlain how many Public Health Nurses were on staff and how many the Health Unit intended to hire, but after the better part of an hour's discussion they were unable to determine a clear picture of the situation.

Free Press

Spurred on by an article in The Acton Free Press and The Canadian Champion about three months ago, McKenzie has been fighting a battle to have health services increased in the northern part of the county.

He claimed inadequacles occurred in the positioning of nurses, noting there was one nurse for every 5,200 people in Oakville, one for every 6,700 in Burlington and just one serving Esquesing and Acton with a joint population of about 15,000.


