Rubber dam fails, floods

A malfunction in the equipment designed to keep the rubber "fabridam" at Scotch Block Dam filled with air is blamed for the flash flood which occurred below the dam in Esquesing Township early Wednesday morning of last

minimal because the creek below the dam flows through a large valley, but many residents were alarmed when the flood water started creeping toward lowlying homes. The water overflowed both the Third and Fourth Lines of Esquesing when narrow culverts could not cope with the sudden load.

Conservation officials estimate they lost over 88,000,000 gallons of water in two and a half hours. The level of the reservoir behind the dam dropped over three feet. Stops quickly

Flooding approximately 8 a.m. but by 8.30 a.m. Authority staff had filled the rubber balloon with water and it had started. At its peak, the dam was releasing an estimated 12,000 cubic feet of water per second.

Problems apparently began around 6 a.m. when the air pressure in the fabridam dropped and the pressure of the water in the 130-acre lake created a "notch" in the top of the dam. Water pressure opened the notch to a width of 20 feet. Conservation Authority technical planner William Warwick said the dam is inflated with air in the winter months and water in warmer months. Engineers haven't been able to figure out why the air pressure dropped that morning.

Ironically, officials were awaiting a new manual from the Los Angeles-based company which sold HRCA the fabridam, which describes how to reset the limits and adjust the conrols of the machinery at the dam, Warwick said.

The manual arrived in Wed- the Third Line.

Compounding the problem was an influx of water into the dam on Tuesday, caused by warmer temperatures and spring runoff.

reported, HRCA superintendent Y. (Slim) Kangas rushed to the site and adjusted the controls to fill the balloon with water. It took only a few minutes to get the flow of water stopped.

Worst flooding occurred at the Third Line beside Boston Church, where water overflowed the road on both sides of a bridge. The Irving and D. Miller families were stranded in their homes for a few hours as the end of their laneway was flooded with a foot of water.

Flood waters also overflowed the Fourth Line but traffic was still able to get through. One farm lane was flooded there as well. At the Schreiber home on Five Sideroad, water lapped 10 feet from the west corner of the

At Highway 25 waters inpped at the side of the highway and filled a low field and parking lot at the nearby Chudleigh Nurseries, but the water was never high enough to meet the road.

Several small trees and stumps were uprooted as the water Monetary damage was inundated lands south of the dam. Some fences and one footbridge crossing the stream were ripped out. HRCA has had lew complaints of damage, however.

The "crest" of the flood water took all day to reach Lake Ontario and the further downstream it went, the slower it went, Warwick said. The flooding reached most of the areas in Esquesing Township within an hour after it started but it took until 2.20 p.m. to reach Derry Rd. in North Oakville and it wasn't at Drumquin until 4 p.m.

Photos helpful

Engineers are still studying the mechanism at the dam to see why the air pressure dropped. Photos of the flood taken by representthe flooding stopped as quickly as atives of this paper are apparently the only pictures available and they are being studied for clues to the reason for the malfunction, and the extent of the flooding. (Two Milton Champion photographers and one from The Acton Free Press were at the scene early Wednesday morning and took about 40 plctures of the flooding at its peak.)

The east branch of the Sixteen Mile Creek meanders through Esquesing and Oakville on its way to the lake. The Scotch Block Dam and Reservoir is a million dollar project, opened last September to control stream flows and provide an adequate summer flow. Golf courses and market gardeners downstream use water from the creek. Located just below the escarpment at the rear of Tangmere Mushroom Co. east of Highway 25 and north of 10 Sideroad, the dam creates a long reservoir that stretches east past

Gauge reading

A stream gauge on the creek where it crosses Highway 25 between Five and 10 Sideroads indicates the brunt of the flood reached there about 6.15 or 6.20 When the problem was a.m., Warwick said. He estimates it would take 15 or 20 minutes for the onrushing water

to reach that point from the dam. Authority officials said there was little chance of another flood happening while the fabridam is filled with water. Engineers are checking the controls to make sure no further malfunctions

Main flooding occurred in the first few miles downstream. By the time it reached Oakville lands, the crest had dissipated and flooding was minimal.

Esquesing Township roads department superintendent Bud Snow said some repairs were necessary to the Third and Fourth Lines but there was no estimate on how much it would cost to put the roads back in


