Lakeview Centre cops AIHL hockey crown

Lakeview Centre are champions of the Acton Industrial Hockey League for the third time in four years and for the third straight year Nielsen's Clothing are also rans.
Gus Holmes scored after eight minutes and 45 seconds of overtime Thursday night to break a 5-5 deadlock in the deciding game of the best of three series. Lakeview won the series opener 5-4, but the clothiers bounced back to force a third game with an 8-7 overtime win in the second contest.

Bob Andrews and John Mason, two standout performers for the champions, assisted on the big goal by Holmes, the only returning member of last season's Lakeview championship team.
Nielsen's were only 17 seconds away from their first ever championship, when Andrews scored to tie the game 5-5 and

force overtime. John Mason and Lloyd Smallwood assisted on that goal.
After a scoreless first period, Lakeview grabbed a 3-2 second period lead. John Mason increased the Lakeview lead to 4-2 with a goal early in the third

period, but Nielsen's struck for three straight goals to take the lead for the first time 5-4.
John Mason bagged a brace and Lloyd Smallwood, Russ Masales, Bob Andrews and Gus Holmes netted singles for the champs. Andrews earned four

assists and Mason picked up three.
