Melt 4 cup butter, and add cup brown sugar. Stir well and cool slightly. Beat in 1 egg and 1 tsp. vanilla, then 4 cup flour and 15 tsp. salt. Stir in 15 cup chopped nuts or dates. (I intend to try coconut next time, and suppose anything you find in your baking cupboard might do). Bake in an 8 inch buttered pan for 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Top should still be

Mix 14 cups whole wheat flour, 4 tsps. baking powder, 14 cup powdered milk, is tsp. salt. Add one-third cup oil, and cut it in well with two knives, then stir

Pour in 34 cup plain yogurt and mix quickly, kneading lightly 12 to 15 times. Pat out to about an inch in thickness and cut with a biscuit cutter. Bake at 450 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes.
