THIS TIME OF DIVISION

Some time ago, when the writer of this article was confined to hospital, he felt compelled to express to a young Yugoslav Canadian citizen who shared a room with him, his feelings with regard to a lack of orderliness on the part of some of the nursing staff in charge of the ward in which he and his fellow-patient were situated. He used the phrase "organized confusion" to describe his own estimation of the matter, much to the amusement of the younger man.

The same statement might be made of international and national affairs, as well as of social conditions in general. We have anti-this and anti-that attitudes everywhere to-day. The result is that such movements as Women's-lib, free abortion law groups, the setting up of homosexual societies and so on, ad infinitum, are the recognized order—or disorder—of the day, depending on which side of the issues one takes. Talk about a permissive society! How permissive can you get—and to what end?

We talk to-day a great deal about the generation gap and with good reason. No matter how much we should like to side-step the problem, it remains and continues to grow among us. Of course, it simply points up the fact that, in spite of all our claims to progress in matters of education, we can be very stupid when it comes to applying our knowledge in a practical way, and this is the only way in which it can be of benefit to anyone.

Each generation of youth should be better than any previous generation because of the advancement made by mankind in the past. It behooves youth to disparage altogether the views of their elders. After all, experience counts and, while the shortcomings of their elders are wide and varied, so also are those of youth.
