# ESQUESING Township Council BRIEFS

At a meeting Monday May 15, Esquesing council:

- Suggested builder Jack Wilson get approval from the Health Unit and then go ahead with plans for a gas bar on property in Norval owned by Mr. Lefebvre on which a service station burned down last year. A permit had been secured to replace the large service station but Mr. Wilson said plans had been changed to just construct a gas bar.
- Told Bill Kamenetzky of R. 1, Limehouse, to sit on plans for a dog boarding kennel at his property on Lot 23, Con. 6 until the township zoning by-law is approved. Then he can see about having it rezoned. Mr. Kamenetzky said he hopes to board dogs while people are away on holidays but council pointed out that although he can board horses dogs are not allowed under the by-law. They would be designated as a commercial use.
- Approved a seven per cent increase in hourly rates for township employees. The new rates are \$3.51 an hour for grader operators, \$3.30 an hour for truck drivers and \$3.14 for laborers. All township benefits are also applicable as well as a 45 hour week.
- Disclosed a special meeting of Council with the township solicitor May 3 had decided to proceed with a writ of summons against Miss Teresa St. Jean to obtain an injunction to stop use of barn on her property for other uses than agriculture. Council has alleged the barn is being used for social purposes.
- Received a letter bearing 102 signatures of Esquesing residents who made no objection to a welding shop run by Charles Speck on Lot 3, Con. 6. Mr. Speck was present at council but the letter was laid aside until a letter from his solicitor is received.
- Reeve Tom Hill presided for the three hour meeting with all councillors present.

# Let's talk about HORSES with Jennifer Barr

**QUESTION:** Could you tell me how you go about cutting the hair off your horse's fetlock?

**ANSWER:** The fetlock is the pastern joint just above the hoof. Clippers or scissors may be used in a feathering motion, much as you would trim your own hair.

But coarse hair needs clippers for a neat job. If your horse is unused to clippers, take it easily. Rub the silent clippers over his legs then turn them on away from him in order to let him get used to the noise.

If he picks up his feet too much, have someone else hold up a forefoot and he should stand still. Clip the long hair at the back of the leg, in the pastern, and around the hoof-heads. It is advisable to leave a wisp of hair as a "drainpipe" attached to the point of the fetlock so that rain won't run into the heel section.

However, if you're showing in halter classes, better trim all the hair.

Long hair acts as a protection against cracked heels (the equine version of chapped hands), so if your horse has to wade through mud, smear his heels with vaseline or Hooflex.

**QUESTION:** What are the chances of winning hunter classes with an American Saddlebred? My gelding has a natural tail, short feet, he is three-gaited, and jumps quite nicely.

**ANSWER:** The question of winning, or even placing, depends entirely on the size of show and on your horse.

I'm very glad to hear you have a natural Saddlebred. They are such beautiful animals without all the artificiality usually employed.

Most Saddlebreds have too high an action to place well as a hunter unless the competition isn't too stiff. A hunter should have a long
