

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Parks staff gets help

Acton Parks and Recreation Committee approved the hiring of an extra mun to cut park grass for a total of 20 days, following a discussion on the parks labor situation at Thursday night's meeting.

Parks Harold manager Townsley asked that an additional man be hired on a full time basis, explaining the present three man crew is now two and a half weeks behind in necessary work in the parks and community centre.

Townsley pointed out that there are now approximately 20 acres of park grass, including 15 acres in Prospect Park itself to cut. Grass must also be cut in Sir Donald Mann park in Glenlea and on the north shore of Fairy Lake.

"The biggest trouble with our jobs in that they're time consuming," Townsley told the committee. He said it takes approximately 45 minutes to take garbage to the town dump with a tractor and wagon.

"That's ridiculous, us taking garbage to the dump with a tractor," Councillor Orval Chapman interjected.

Chapman said town workmen pick up garbage at local schools and that they should be able to pick it up at the park as well.

Committee member Barry inscoosnid he couldn't justify the hiring of another full time man, although he conceded extra help is needed for grass cutting in the summer time. Criticizes committee

Inacoe charged parks staff is not being utilized to the best advantage now. He was particularly critical of the committee's consent to have the porks manager and both staffers

attend a course in Guelph Inst week, all at the same time. "This is ridiculous that we should have all three men away

at a prime time of the year, when there's lots of work to be done." be charged. He suggested the parks manager only be allowed to attend the course.

"We've lost 80 work hours right there by having our other two employees away," he said. Chairman Hugh Patterson informed inscoe the policy of

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"Well it's a poor policy Hugh," Inscee replied. Townsley said it was an ad-

vantage to have the men attend the course, because of the parks and recreation grant structure. The more credits the men receive, the more grants are available, he explained.
