

Establish rental fees increase ice rates

Hard pressed to implement budget proposals, because of yearly cutbacks by town council, Acton Parks and Recreation Committee has decided to establish rates for arena rental and increase ice rental rates, in order to obtain additional

The new rates were approved unanimously at the committee's regular meeting Thursday night and will become effective June I. Five events, June 10, June 18, September 3, July 23 and Labor Day weekend, which have already been booked, will be excluded.

In future, ice skating and roller skating spectators will also be charged 25 cents. The charge was approved in a close 3-2 vote.

Will return tombstones.

Two tombstones which turned up in an industrial plant parking lot in Georgetown nearly two weeks ago, are believed to have been taken from a ploneer cemetery in the area. Police urge knowing proper location of the stones to notify them immediately.

One stone was inscribed "Joseph Cunnington, died Nov. 17, 1856 at the age of 22 years and six months", while the second was in memory of three-year-old Henry E. Kleg who died in 1852, the son of George and Eliza Kleg.

Councillor Orval Chapman and committee members Diane Spielvogel and Gil Malcolm voting in the affirmative and members Ian McGillivary and Barry Inscoe in the negative. Councillor Peter Marks was absent from the meeting and chairman Hugh Patterson casts a vote only in the case of a tie.

New fees Fee for arena rental from all out of town organizations and for dances, staged by local organizations will be \$150. Local events other than dances will command a fee of \$75. A charge of \$250 has been set for rental of facilities for a three day weekend.

Ice rental fees for local figure skating and minor hockey organizations will take an across the board jump of \$1. New hourly rate for figure skating, Legion minor hockey and novice, peewee and bantam O.M.H.A. teams is \$8.50. Midget and juvenile rate will be \$12.

Hourly rate for local industrial hockey has been increased from \$15 to \$17, while the rate for all out of town ice rental has jumped from \$20 to \$23.

Councillor Chapman said the committee expects to take in an additional \$1500 a year in revenue. He pointed out the new rates are still considerably below figures in Georgetown and

Explaining his opposition to the spectators, McGillivary said he couldn't see it, if a large number of parents are coming along with their children so that they can help them tie their skates up. Double taxation

"It's sort of a double taxation on them," he charged. Arena manager Harold Townsley thought most of the parents accompanying their

children skate anyway. Chapman reminded the committee that in some municipalities spectators are charged no matter what the event is. Chairman Patterson said the

spectator charge in Georgetown

is 60 cents.


