12 calves chosen for Queen's Guineas

Twelve 4-H beef calves were nominated for the Queen's Guineas Competition in Halton County. The calves were weighed on test on Monday, May 8.
To qualify for the final entry in the Queen's Guineas Class at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair all nominated entries must make an average daily rate of gain of at least two and one-tenth pounds for the five month period preceding Oct. 15 based on the official weighing at the beginning and ending of that period. They must also obtain a weight per day of age of 1.8 pounds based on final weighing and date of birth as indicated at the first weighing. The steer must be sired by a purebred or recorded bull of a beef breed, weigh at least 75 pounds on Oct. 15, and be approved from the standpoint of type, confirmation and finish by a county culling committee.

To qualify
To be eligible to compete in this class an exhibitor must be a qualified member of an Ontario 4-H Club in 1972 and be at least 14 years of age on Jan. 1, 1972. He or she must have participated in a local achievement day and completed all phases of the 4-H program satisfactorily. Previous winners of the Queen's Guineas are not eligible.

Mrs. Anna Kril, wife of Fred Kril, was a long time resident of Acton. She passed away at her residence at 101 Hillcrest peacefully in her sleep on May 18, in her 69th year.

Move Elizabeth sidewalk next

Legalities are being straightened away by council, prior to the installation of sidewalk on Elizabeth Dr. sometime this year.

Part of the roadway to the north of Elizabeth Dr., just off Main, will be closed off. Additional land from the Branczewicz estate is being acquired to the south, so the roadway may be moved over nine feet.

The deeds are all signed for the transfer of land, but the town can not proceed with the required bylaws until the closing off of part of the roadway has been advertised. (The advertisement appears for the first time in the Free Press today.)

Council has budgeted money for the sidewalk but road work will not be done this year. Traffic will not be stopped up at any time.

Elizabeth at its entrance bends to accommodate houses there. Councillor Marks said he was "totally opposed" to this way of doing the road project but he was so happy to see the sidewalk coming he wouldn't oppose it.

Blames children
Councillor Masales had harsh words for some of the children who use Elizabeth Dr. They need education—or sore behinds—as well as a sidewalk, Mr. Masales asserted. They walk all over the road. He wondered about a safety patrol there.

Tenders have not yet been called for the project but roads chairman Masales indicated this would be soon.
Contracts awarded
Dontree Sales Limited received the contract to repaint crosswalks, stop bars, parking stalls and the centre lines through town in yellow paint. Price was \$565. This was the

lower of two tenders.
At a special meeting of the public works committee prior to the regular council meeting, 12 tenders were reviewed for the Erin-Esqueving townline water line. Councillors on the advice of their engineer accepted the low tender of Twin Bee Construction Ltd., Oakville, for \$50,959.50. Tenders went as high as \$83,245. Two tenderers were local.
