OSSTF chief re-elected after severe criticism

elected as president of Halton Chapter of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation at the Group's annual meeting Wednesday. His victory came only after loud and severe criticism both from one of his opponents for the presidency and several spokesmen from the

Whike Oaks teacher Dan McLean and a General Wolfe teacher Tom Patience to retain his seat. As a base for his campaign Patience attacked the president as a poor

Poor leader

He said he and others were tired and frustrated with present leadership. He claimed his only reason for running was to replace inept leadership with a unified force.

McLean made no reference to a lack of leadership but felt a pressing need for the federation to become more representative of the teachers and achieve greater liaison with the community. He urged greater involvement by teachers in federation work.

Ramautarsingh reviewed his year in office and explained what he felt were priorities for the coming year. He felt the federation should be looking at use of para-professionals, class size, and other innovations taking place at the Halton County Board of Education.

"If you elect a poor leader you will have a sinking ship and have a smiling board of education," he

warned. Art Walker charged the president spoke from a position of weakness rather than strength and criticized him for having treasurer Henry Rapcewicz speak for him as part of his speech. He said he was stacking the deck. "The more I hear you speak the more concerned I become."

Walker was the first of several who openly showed doubt about the president's capacity as a leader. Principal Ken Foster engaged in a verbal battle with president.

Foster asked if the president felt the executive had operated as a unified body. Ramautarsingh said for the better part yes but added Foster couldn't be included in that yea.


