Since Bruce Andrews joined the teaching staff at Acton High, the school has never failed to send a representative to the prestigious OFSSAA track and field championships.

Thanks to hours of hard work and practice by javelin thrower Steve Van Fleet, the AHS red and white colors will be flying again this year, when Ontario's finest high school athletes convene in Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium Friday.

Following a splendid performance in the school track and field meet in which he placed first in four events and second in three others, Steve won the Halton County secondary schools' junior hoys' javelin event with a record toss of 159 feet.

Last week he bettered that toss by seven feet in winning the Halton-Peel championship.

OFSSAA record for the event is 197 feet, but neither Steve nor coach Andrews is awed by the figure.

"Steve's quite capable of doing that," Andrews comment. "He's thrown 194 feet in practice and a 202 foot toss he made at the Halton-Peel meet wasn't counted."

Acton High has had two previous Ontario champions, Jim Slaven and John Goy Jr. Slaven won both the 3000 metres and cross-country. Goy earned a red ribbon in the midget boys' pole vault. Phil Morris competed in both the 800 and 1600 metre events at last year's meet.

Andrews himself gained notoriety, when he placed second behind Bruce Kidd in the 1 mile event at the 1962 OFSSAA meet at the University of Guelph.






