

Refer TECO report

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Dick Howitt agreed any body spending as much money as HRCAs should be under the regional government's control he felt the nature of conservation dictated a need for it to be left as it is, because it takes "a special breed of dedicated people."

Much consideration was given to direct elections as opposed to indirect elections. Burlington Mayor George Harrington suggested a directly elected official loses part of his brain

soon after the swearing-in ceremony and tends to forget the people to whom they are responsible.

Some favored a proposal where the councillors are elected to municipal councils first and then to the regional council. Harrington and some others agreed regional representatives should have to answer to local councils.

Oakville Councillor Rick Day felt it would be expensive for members to run at large and warned that party politics would become firmly entrenched in the

system. He suggested each of the three political parties backed councillors in Oakville now to some degree.

Should be responsible
Oakville Councillor Don Gordon felt regional councillors should be responsible to the local councils. He urged the assembly not to throw out the report. "There is some good in every report. Take the best of it."

TECO reasoned the direct election would be the best because it would encourage councillors to look at the county as a whole and prevent a

parochial attitude. Burlington Mayor George Harrington suggested only benefitting areas of the county should be taxed for services. Noting the difference between rural and urban areas, the mayor indicated the demands for police and fire protection varied and the need or demand for parks varied throughout the county.

Toronto woman hurt

A Toronto woman, Maria Cordeiro, is in satisfactory condition in Wellesley Hospital following a one car accident on Highway 25, just north of Acton Friday night about 7:30.

Mrs. Cordeiro, driver of the car was treated for severe facial lacerations at Guelph General Hospital and later transferred to Wellesley. A passenger in the car, Hernando Cordeiro, received minor injuries.

According to North Halton OPP, the Cordeiro car, a 1965 Pontiac attempted to pass two cars, swerved to avoid a third oncoming vehicle, went off the road and flipped over near the bottom of a culvert.

Investigate six minor collisions

Officers of the Acton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police investigated 21 general occurrences during the reporting week of May 28 to June 4.

Investigations ranged from insecure premises to a report of theft from a parked car.

Officers laid two charges of causing a disturbance and investigated two complaints of assault. Three males were apprehended after escaping from the reformatory at Guelph. There was only one charge laid under the Liquor Control Act.

There were six reportable motor vehicle collisions during the reporting week. Only one of the accidents resulted in personal injury, fortunately it was minor.

Motorists are reminded to use extra care, when driving in school zones and cross-walk areas. Remember, when approaching pedestrian crosswalks or cross-walks, the pedestrian has the right of way.

The Ontario Provincial Police is continually receiving updated results of tests involving the use of seat belts. After studying a number of such tests, it has been concluded that seat belts play a prominent part in reducing the number of injuries and deaths sustained in motor vehicle collisions.
