## Erin man dies in crash

Two men lost their lives in two separate collisions on Friday night in the Milton area.

Milton Police say Clifford J. Griffin, 31, of R.R. 2, Erin, was driving south on Martin St. at Steeles Ave. when his car came in contact with an auto operated by Herbert Robinson, 56, of Tremaine Rd. Oakville, who was travelling eastbound on Steeles Ave.

According to police, Griffin died at the spot. Robinson was taken to Milton District Hospital for treatment of injuries. On Monday, hospital officials said Robinson was suffering from bruised muscles and a possible back injury.

**Thrown into pole**

Estimated damage to the Griffin car was \$2,100; to the Robinson vehicle \$750. Force of the impact flipped Griffin's small imported car onto its side and it

slammed into a sign post at Bell Bros. garage—roof first. The deceased was alone in the car at the time.

Friday's second fatality involved a member of the Canadian Armed Forces. Milton OPP say Private First Class Ted Feret of the Armed Forces base at Camp Borden lost his life in a single car accident.

Police say the deceased had been driving on Highway 401 just east of Highway 25 when the car went out of control and flipped over, tossing him out.

**Car, bus collide**

Milton OPP also report an accident between a car and bus on Sunday morning, north of Milton.

Driving the car was Mrs. June Gould of R.R. 3, Milton. Operating a Trailways of Canada Ltd. bus was Harvey Corkindale of Willowdale.

OPP say the car was travelling southbound on Highway 25, while the bus was heading north in the vicinity of the Dew Drop Inn Restaurant when the accident occurred. The bus was making a left turn into a private lane when the collision happened, say police. Mrs. Gould was taken to Milton District Hospital for lacerations and was released after treatment. Occupants on the bus, members of a church band from Toronto, were unhurt.

Estimated damage to the Gould car was \$1,000; to the bus \$150.

A total of 18 accidents occurred in the North Halton area patrolled by Milton OPP during the week of May 28 and June 3, say police.

Ten persons were injured in nine of the collisions and total property damage is estimated at over \$18,900.

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## Solid waste study

The Ministry of the Environment has approved a subsidy for a Halton County Solid Waste Management Study, Warden J. Swainborough announced. Total cost of the study will be approximately \$60,000 of which 50 per cent will be paid by the Province. Halton County has budgeted \$30,000 in its 1972 current budget for the study.

Last February Halton County Council applied to the province for a subsidy as a result of a move to expand a solid waste management study which two of the municipalities of the County — Burlington and Oakville — had already started.

**Forecast need**

The purpose of the study is to forecast the future quantities and classification of solid waste and to ascertain the future requirements for disposal facilities. Methods of disposal, including sanitary landfill, pulverization and central incineration, will be reviewed and a 20 year master plan for solid waste disposal will be developed.

The Technical Committee, made up of staff representatives from the county and all municipalities in Halton County met this week to review the guidelines for the study and make further recommendations to county council for implementation of the study.

Milton Reeve Ron Harris advocated such a study be made in 1970 and the early portion of 1971. Milton is one of those communities that will be looking for a solution to solid waste disposal in the near future. The sanitary land fill site is rapidly reaching its limit.

## Liberal annual

# Praise Trudeau record

The record of the Trudeau administration is a good one, Halton MP Rud Whiting and Alastair Gillespie, federal Minister of Science and Technology told 80 Liberals Friday at the Halton and Halton East Liberal Association's annual meeting.

Gillespie said opponents of Trudeau will attack him as being arrogant. "He is the warmest leader we've seen."

Gillespie said the press have seen that Robert Stanfield is not coming through as an opposition leader and have tried to take over for him. "They haven't made it easy."

**Look ahead**

"The Trudeau administration has tried to plan beyond the four year mandate. We have caught up in pollution."

Gillespie pointed to the signing of the agreement between the United States and Canada to clean up the great lakes as a great step.

He saw the innovation of three new departments, urban affairs, science and technology and the environment as positive steps.

Gillespie told Liberals that people too often considered their problems instead of their opportunities.

He challenged them to look at other countries and compared Canada with the troubled U.S. and United Kingdom with 1,000,000 people out of work. He urged Liberals to ward off any non-issues and concentrate on the Trudeau record.

**Life more enjoyable**

MP Whiting said the federal government had made life more enjoyable for Canadians through the introduction of consumer legislation and protection.

He listed protection of the great lakes, establishment of new fishing boundaries, the Arctic area protection act, overhauling the criminal law and tax reform as steps the federal government has taken.

Whiting said that Stanfield should be reminded of his record in Nova Scotia when he criticizes the Liberal government. "There was more money per capita plowed into the heavy water project in Nova Scotia than what the United States pays in their space program. The difference is the US has been to the moon and Nova Scotia still hasn't made heavy water."

He reviewed the government record noting senior citizen housing, the greatest wheat sales ever and increases in the old age pension as accomplishment.

**Trudeau believers**

"In 1968 we had Trudeau charisma and now we have Trudeau believers."

Ernie Zechman was re-elected president of the association. John Bryant, Bill Manderson, Elizabeth Robson and Judy Savage were elected vice-presidents. Bruce Christie won a seat as secretary and D. Marlot was named treasurer. Each was named by the nominating committee. No election was needed in either case as all won seats by acclamation.

## Dairy Princess to be crowned

The annual search is on—Halton's 1972 Dairy Princess will be crowned on Wednesday, June 28 in a competition to be held at Oakville Dairy.

Joe Brent, Halton's milk fieldman at the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food office in Milton, reports the Halton County Milk Committee will again sponsor Halton's search for a capable princess to represent the county at the Canadian National Exhibition contest.

"To date three or four girls are interested, but anyone else interested in entering is certainly

welcome," he said.

**Open house**

This year instead of having the contest at a dairy farm the site has been shifted to the Oakville Dairy, and an open house will be held at the dairy on the evening of the contest. The contestants will have dinner with the three outside judges, then speak to the crowd at 7.30 p.m. and compete in a cow milking contest at 8 p.m.

Mr. Brent said the committee hopes to have Nancy Brown of Grand Valley, Ontario's 1971-72 Dairy Princess, on hand for the event. Nancy is a former Hornby girl and is well known in Halton.

## Good housekeeping by-law is studied

An Etobicoke good housekeeping by-law may be the guideline for Nassagaweya Township to control unsightly properties in the municipality.

Mrs. E. M. Robinson of R.R. 1, Campbellville presented Nassagaweya Council with a copy of the by-law on Monday night, after complaining about the condition of some properties along the Guelph Line from Campbellville north to the 10th Sideroad.

"I hope you won't be offended with an Etobicoke by-law," quipped the speaker, who said under present Nassagaweya by-laws there wasn't much either the municipality or ratepayers could do about unattractive properties.

The clerk for Etobicoke informed me that this type of by-law could only be implemented in municipalities with an official plan, which I understand this township does have," said Mrs. Robinson.

Members of Council agreed with Mrs. Robinson's claim that "slummy properties" distract from neat appearance of the township and decrease property values.

Council agreed to study the Etobicoke plan at an upcoming by-law committee meeting and to forward a copy of the by-law to the Nassagaweya Planning Board.
