Another victim of Cataract falls

A Toronto woman fell 40 feet over the falls at Cataract, on the Credit River recently and suffered a broken leg and head injuries.

Twenty-three year-old Frances May Dattels was dangling her feet in the water above the falls at the popular tourist spot when she lost her balance and tumbled over the falls. She landed on a rock ledge in shallow water where she was rescued. She is the fourth victim to tumble over the falls in recent years after almost 30 years of accident-free visits. Cataract is about two miles up the river from Forks of the Credit. It is the site of an old electrical generating plant where the river cascades into the steep gully-like valley.
