Sedate Miltonians, accumstomed to success, got two black eyes last week when it was found the Tommy Hunter show, sponsored by the combined service clubs of the town, was a financial flop. To add insult to injury the local paper, The Champion, also reported that the Optimists Club's auction receipts totalling \$1,222 were stolen from right under the eyes of organizers and buyers.

Tominy Hunter and his show attracted only 380 people and there was a loss of at least \$200 and possibly \$400.

Chairman of the community services club, Dave Brush, unhappy with the result, said "The only thing people in Milton will show up for is a fire—that's because it is free." He claimed many of the people at the show were from outside Milton.

At the fair ground auction a six hour clear-out by five volunteer auctioneers, totalling 480 sales, went to naught when thieves cleared out the cash sometime between 6.30 and 7.30 p.m. Also taken were a fishing tackle box used for cash and the clipboard listing buyers and prices. The empty box has since been recovered.


