Ebenezer U.C.W. learns of Rhodesia

Intended for last week Ebenezer U.C.W. had a special treat when Mr. Wilfred Easley of Milton talked about Rhodesia and showed pictures of his visit there with his daughter Vicki, who is a physiotherapist. His visit was shortly after Rhodesia declared its independence.

They are losing support from Britain, and not getting the support they need from the natives. There was no replacement for the doctor at the mission, when he left, and for some time there was no qualified nurse. Vicki and her friend, Janet Webster, were for some time the only so-called "Europeans" in that particular section.

Rhodesia was first begun to be opened to modern progress, after Cecil Rhodes discovered it in 1890. While very rich in natural resources, it is a country of contrasts. Where irrigation can be afforded, (by rich white people) several crops a year can be grown. Buildings cannot be made of wood, on account of the ants. The roofs are of sheet metal.

Mrs. Joss introduced the speaker, saying that in his childhood he used to drive up from Campbellville to visit his Uncle Levi, at that time storekeeper at Brookville. The family connection would fill 17 seats in Ebenezer Church. Mrs. A. Norrish thanked Mr. Easley for his interesting talk.

S.P.I.N. means Stop Pollution in Nassagaweya.

This is a most worthwhile undertaking and the enterprising people who started it deserve a lot of credit. Probably there are still many residents not taking advantage of this opportunity, to re-cycle reusable materials, instead of having them clutter up the countryside. Every first Saturday of each month, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. there are volunteers at Brookville Hall to receive donations. Newsprint, well bundled, (not magazines, or weekly glossy papers); glass, washed, and colored bottles kept separate from clear glass; aluminum and bi-metals, (such as the opening tab from a pop can), and tin cans, flattened, washed and with both ends removed—these are the materials, which are reusable.

It is now being used in Brampton, for paving, making "glassphalt".

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
